NATIONWIDE DRIVE OPENS HERE SUNDAY IN LOCAL CHURCH

The Central Church of Christ will launch a four-year program beginning Sunday, February 8. The day will be designated as Mobilization Day. The campaign, which is called the Christian Education Advance, is a part of a national movement in many Protestant churches in the United States. The announced goal calls for a 10 per cent increase in enrollment and attendance each year. If successful, it will mean an increase of at least 3,000,000 in church school attendance in America.

This program comes in answer to a plea of national leaders in business, politics and religious organizations for a return of the people to Christianity as a way to stop the deterioration of morals and character among American citizens, which many believe is a definite threat to democracy and freedom.

Statisticians report that the crime bill in the United States is nearly \$15,000,000,000 annually. American people spent more than \$15,000,000,000 for alcoholic liquor in 1939 and \$7,000,000,000 in gambling places. The alarming statement comes from the U. S. government that 14,000,000 petty crimes are committed annually and most of them by offenders under 21 years of age; that there is a major crime every 22 seconds and a murder every hour.

Along by the side of this disclosure, in the United States there are 27,000,000 boys and girls under 21 years of age receiving no religious training. It is with these thoughts in mind that many Protestant groups are redoubling their efforts to make the churches of the nation the great moral force they have been in the past.

The Christian Advance program to be inaugurated here has details worked out as to methods of procedure. Stress will naturally be on attendance first, but improved teaching, better programs and better equipment will also be emphasized. Finally, definite plans are included for bringing the church school members into active church membership.

MARRIED MEN NOW ACCEPTED BY NAVY

Married men and men who have dependents other than wife may be accepted for enlistment or re-enlistment in the U. S. Marine Corps now, provided the applicant can furnish the recruiting officer with an affidavit sworn to by the wife or other dependents that she or they are not dependent upon the applicant for financial support beyond his ability to contribute on the pay of a private in the U. S. Marine Corps. This announcement was officially transmitted to the Marine Corps recruiting office at Walla Walla, Wash., today, from the headquarters at Washington, D. C. The recruiting station at Walla Walla is the nearest Marine Corps recruiting office in this vicinity.
