**POT LUCK DINNER
ENJOYED BY FARM
BUREAU MEMBERS**

Many Farm Bureau members and auxiliary ladies attended the pot luck dinner and meeting held Monday evening in the Columbia club house. President A. H. Cable presided. During the meeting County Agent Walter Holt of Pendleton was welcomed and brought a splendid impromptu review of farm organization inceptions in the U. S. He pointed out that farm organization has always come about at a depression time in history when farm peoples have realized that their needs can most be accomplished by mass unity.

Now Granges and Farm Bureaus and other such organizations are growing in numbers showing that farmers of America realize that a tremendous task of producing ever increasing food goals will take cooperative effort in the face of equipment shortage, labor shortage and ever rising seed costs, higher production costs without knowing market prices to reimburse farmers for extra effort. The high wages in defense areas have greatly increased the farmer's problems.

Other speakers included Sam Hunter, in charge of membership drive for the State Farm Bureau Federation. In March plans will be completed for a large banquet at which time Farm Bureau members and other farmers who for their own benefit should be aligned with such an organization, will be issued invitation dinner tickets to be guests at this large affair to be held in Hermiston.

Arthur Blomgren of the Triple A office in Pendleton explained the new "Wheat For Feed Bill" which makes wheat in this locality available to farmers at a saving in bulk truck lots. Additional information may be received at the office of the assistant county agent, Gene Lear.

President Cable urged all members to pay dues before March 1 in order to receive special rate on the Herald. Since the hour was late, the election of officers was postponed to the next meeting.

**GRANGE GROUP
ISSUES REPORT**

The following report was submitted by the committee on co-operation for Umatilla County Pomona Grange at its meeting in Pendleton February 5, 1942:

"After a brief survey of the scope of co-operative enterprises in the county for the year 1941, we listed thirteen co-operative organizations with a combined membership of 6,135. Of course, many of these memberships are duplications as, in many cases, one party will belong to four or five different organizations. On the other hand, when you consider that only the head of a family is a member, you can see quite a few people are affected.

"These people, through their organizations, buy co-operatively such items as feed, seed, fertilizers, gas and oil products, sprays, hardware, electric supplies and appliances, fuel, farm machinery and equipment, and groceries. They pack and sell co-operatively prunes, cherries and other fruits, grain, butterfat, turkeys and poultry products; operate cold storage plants, handle insurance, make loans to members, and do their own laundry and canning in a co-operatively owned plant.

"These several concerns did a combined gross business in 1941 of \$2,849,400.00 which would be a nice little nest egg for anyone. Nearly all of these organizations reported a net gain in both membership and business for the year."
