### KING TO DISCUSS ALKALI CONTROL

At a meeting to be held at the Stanfield Grange hall in Stanfield on Tuesday, February 24th, at 2:00 p. m., Art King, Extension Soils Specialist, Oregon State college, will assist the farmers in this end of Umatilla county in discussing fertilizer programs, cover crops, and soil conservation and irrigation practices.

Since many commercial fertilizers are becoming hard to obtain, Mr. King will tell of the best methods to cope with this situation. He will discuss the various fertilizers to be used for different cropping practices.

The alkali problem and its control will be dealt with by Mr. King. He will also discuss cropping practices that are best adapted to alkali land.

The Mac High-Hermiston contest here Wednesday was a thriller from the opening whistle with the crowd on its feet much of the last half. The final minutes saw the lead change two times with Hermiston missing two chances to tie the count by missing foul conversions.
