In the second period the Pioneers began finding the basket and before the Hermiston quintet could score, they had a 10-8 lead. The Bulldogs then tied it up with free throws by Rugg and Cullen but Mac-Hi again took the lead when Magruder was fouled by Holloman and converted the throw. The quarter ended with Rugg shooting from the key and putting Hermiston in the lead 12-11.

At the start of the half Mac-Hi found the basket and tallied four counters before the Hermiston team could score. Tiller again put Hermiston in the game on a shot from the key. From then on the quarter was rough with Hermiston losing the services of Ray Holloman when he went out on fouls. The period ended with the score 15-14 for Mac-Hi.

The fourth period started fast but when Cullen, Hermiston guard, went out, Mac-Hi began building up their lead until both squads sent in numerous subs.
