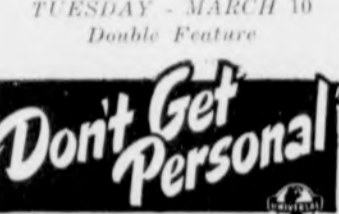

ENLIST NOW IS URGENT REQUEST

Best way for young men, 18 to 20 years of age, who want to become commissioned officers in the United States army, is to enlist immediately, Lt. Col. B. H. Hensley, district recruiting officer for Oregon, revealed Tuesday.

Emphasizing the excellent material turned up in this age group, Colonel Hensley pointed out that "first come, first served" will be the rule with selections for the 75,000 additional commissions scheduled to be assigned as rapidly as possible.

All men who have completed four months of service, which includes the 13 weeks' basic training period, may apply for appointment to an officer candidate school. Selections are made on the basis of the applicant's record in civil life and his record during service in the ranks.
