GROWERS CAN GET BURLAP BAGS FOR WOOL, SEED SPUDS

Additional supplies of burlap for bagging wool and seed potatoes have been made available by the War Production Board, the Umatilla County USDA War Board has been informed. Conservation of existing supplies of burlap bags is still necessary, however, A. R. Coppock, chairman of the county board, warns.

Farmers should still adopt a policy of "use no hooks" in handling sacks, the chairman said. Burlap supplies will continue to be very short, as the war has removed the principal source of burlap imports.

The original burlap order provides 2,500,000 yards of bags for wool growers, compared with an estimated need approximately double that figure. The quantity of burlap made available for seed potatoes in the original order also was short of the need.

Farmers and shippers should contact their normal suppliers for bags, the chairman said. The amendment to the burlap conservation order provides that those wishing to obtain burlap bags for wool and seed potatoes, as stated in the amendment, shall provide the bag manufacturer with the following statement:

"The undersigned hereby certifies

to his vendor and to the War Production Board, that the Agricultural Bags covered by the annexed purchase order are needed for packing and shipping of wool or seed potatoes, and they are needed by him for such use or for distribution to others for use by them; that to the best of the undersigned's knowledge and belief, such bags will be so used within the next thirty days after—(insert here the date when receipt of bags is required). The undersigned further certifies that the amount of Agricultural Bags covered by the annexed purchase order, together with all such bags, new or second hand, now held by the undersigned or now scheduled to be received by the undersigned on or before the delivery date specified in the annexed purchase order, will not be in excess of the amount required by him for use in the said thirty-day period.

"The undersigned further certifies that all reasonable efforts have been made by the undersigned to obtain and use some other form of packaging but have not been successful."

'Emerald Isle' of Ireland Noted for Green Foliage

Among the islands of the world, Ireland ranks high in public interest. It is not the largest but it is the homeland of the Irish people and that has set it apart in the minds of men.

Ireland is nearly the same size as the State of Maine. It is not much more than one-third as large as the nearby island of Great Britain.

If Ireland had as many people per square mile as Great Britain, it would have a population of more than 16,000,000. As it is, the population is less than 4,500,000.

An old name for Ireland is "Emerald Isle." This name refers to the fact that the island is extremely rich in plant life, with green grass, shrubs, and trees. An emerald is green, and so is Ireland. An Irish poet, Dr. William Drennan, is believed to have been the first to use the term "Emerald Isle," when he composed a poem about a century and a half ago.

Other names for Ireland are "Erin" and "Eire." They are two forms of the same name.

"Eire" is pronounced "Aireh." It is used as an official name for the part of Ireland formerly known as the Irish Free State. It includes all of Ireland except six counties in the north.

At the start of the European war, Eire declared herself "neutral." Northern Ireland, on the other hand, stood by Great Britain from the outbreak of warfare. The people were firmly for the British in their fight against Hitler.

Eliminate Elasticity

Through Improved Process

An improved process for the finishing of viscose rayon fabrics, which is expected further to stimulate the steady expansion of the use of rayon in the apparel field, has been developed. The new development, which involves the control of elasticity in rayon much in the same manner as sanitizing controls the shrinkage of cotton textiles, will be made available to rayon finishers soon.

The elimination of extreme elasticity in rayon is based on a chemical formula and application of the process to the finishing of viscose fabrics does not require additional machinery. This feature, and the fact that both rayon finishers and consumers have desired some development which would eliminate both the shrinking and stretching characteristics of rayon apparel, likely will result in a substantial demand for the process.

While it is generally recognized that sanitizing as applied to cotton is still on the upgrade, the increasing tendency to substitute rayon for cotton was beginning to have a retarding effect. It is estimated that upwards of two-thirds of the cotton mills employing the sanitizing process have, in recent years, substituted, in varying proportion of capacity, the weaving of rayon for cotton.

Grouping Unit Furniture

In the first place, an interesting grouping of unit furniture against a long wall frequently provides a center of interest in a room that is without an architectural focal point. And it invariably presents an opportunity for fresh and different arrangements of furniture. For by making full use of all the wall areas it immediately opens up the central floor space and makes the room seem larger and less crowded. A large rectangular room with windows across one end and two long walls to contend with, is difficult to give distinction to, but you can succeed by using long, low tiers of unit shelves opposite each other along both long walls. The shelves of the unit pieces may be filled with books which lend a deeply glowing color accent. You could arrange a collection of antique art objects along the top to add greater distinction.

Automobile Sickness

Recent authorities of nausea resulting from prolonged automobile riding have led some authorities to believe that frequently such car-sickness results from ocular fatigue, reports the Better Vision institute.

When an automobile is moving rapidly, objects flit in and out of one's line of vision. If the eye mechanism is in balance and functions easily, the images formed on each retina are transformed simultaneously to the brain, where they fuse properly. In the case of muscular or other unbalance in the seeing mechanism, considerable strain is placed upon the eyes to bring about the adjustment needed to obtain a simultaneous recording in the brain of the images supplied by both eyes. It is believed, says the institute, that the efforts to make these adjustments cause fatigue that often results in nausea.

History Moved, Not Man

Alexander Scheffer lived from birth to death within an area of three blocks in the town of Schaffers-town, Pa., and still was a resident of four different counties. He was born in Chester county, married in Lancaster county, died in Dauphin county and was buried in Lebanon county. The territory in which he lived was subdivided from 1712 to 1786, thus accounting for the changes, historical researchers said.

MARINES ASK FOR RADIO OPERATORS

Radio technicians and RADAR maintenance men are wanted by the marine corps immediately, according to Staff Sergeant Robert E. Lucas, in charge of the Walla Walla recruiting station.

Applications will be accepted from any man 17 to 35 years of age, inclusive, holding a high school diploma and an amateur radio operator's license. In the absence of above license, a man may have a commercial radio telegraph or radio telephone operator's license or have been engaged in actual repair of radio equipment for at least three months.

Upon passing the physical examination, such an applicant will be sent to the Base Signal Battalion at San Diego for further assignment to a special course in RADAR maintenance. Recruit training is waived and a rating of staff sergeant is offered immediately. Men who fail to qualify in the schooling will be discharged or retained in the service for other duty as requested.

Others with less experience will be enlisted for general radio duties, given regular recruit training, and then assigned to the signal battalion as privates. Those who fail in this schooling will be retained for general duty with the marine corps.

FARM LABOR NEEDED FOR VICTORY FOODS

Farm workers to replace the farm boys serving in the armed forces and relieve expected shortage of migrant laborers, is one of the key problems of Oregon's "Plant and Plan for Victory" month, announces A. R. Coppock, county war board chairman. Many of Umatilla county's 1942 war food goals will depend upon closest cooperation between growers, workers, and the public in preventing serious farm labor shortages.

"All young people, women and families experienced in seasonal agricultural labor or willing to help production of Food for Victory, can do their part by registering with the U. S. Employment Service Office at 201 S. E. Court Avenue, Pendleton, Oregon. "Harvesting of the county's 400 acres of sugar beets, and approximately 34,000 acres of peas as well as dairy production and general

farm labor, are essential in our battle of food."

Growers can cooperate with the war board in making most conservative estimates possible of their labor needs, registering their needs with the farm placement section of the U. S. Employment Service Office, and planning most efficient use of available labor, it was explained. Arrangements may have to be made for transportation of workers of growers' fields through use of school buses and cooperation among growers in making trucks available.

"The war board is receiving the fullest cooperation from the farm placement section of the U. S. Employment Service, the County Land Use Planning committee, the Extension Service, and Farm Security administration, together with farm agencies and processors in working out plans for labor needs," Mr. Coppock said. "Every effort will be made to secure needed workers, provide suitable shelter and sanitary facilities, and make efficient use of available workers through cooperation of growers, workers and agencies concerned."

Growers and workers concerned are invited to present their suggestions for meeting probable shortages to the county war board or its members.
