How to Make Hot Cross Buns

HOT CROSS BUNS
8 to 8½ cups sifted 1 tsp. salt
purpose flour 1 egg
1 tsp. cinnamon ¼ cup softened
½ tsp. nutmeg butter or mar-garine
1 cup milk 1 cup seedless
raisins
¼ cake fresh yeast ½ cup currants
¼ cup sugar ½ cup currants

Sift and measure flour and sift again with spices. Heat milk until bubbles form around edge; add water and cool to lukewarm. Add crumbled yeast, sugar and salt, stirring until yeast is dissolved, add beaten egg, then flour mixture all at once. Add butter or margarine, raisins and currants and work until dough leaves side of bowl. Turn out on lightly floured board, knead gently until smooth, about 3 minutes. Place dough in greased bowl, cover with damp cloth. Let rise in warm place until double in bulk, about 2 hours. Remove from bowl, onto lightly floured board. Shape into ball, place on floured board, divide into four portions, shape each into ball; cover with damp cloth; and let stand 15 minutes. Divide each ball into 8 small ones, place on greased baking sheet 2 inches apart, cover; and let rise until almost double in bulk. Brush with egg wash (1 egg yolk beaten with 3 tablespoons water); cut shallow crosses with acornos on top of each roll. Bake 5 minutes in moderately hot oven (425° F.); reduce to moderate oven (350° F.); and bake 15 to 20 minutes longer, or until done. When almost cold, mark crosses with thin icing made of powdered sugar and just enough cream to spread easily. Makes 32 buns.
