FULL PLANTINGS OF POTATO ACREAGE URGED BY COPPOCK

Umatilla county potato growers can make full plantings this year with the assurance of fair prices for the crop next fall, A. R. Coppock, chairman of the county AAA committee, said yesterday in announcing details of the Department of Agriculture's new price support program.
To head off any possible potato shortage, the program is designed to encourage AAA cooperators to plant their full potato acreage allotments in 1942, the chairman said.
Prices will be supported through government purchases in each of the major producing areas at scheduled base prices, for potato grading U.S. No. 1 or better, sacked f.o.b. in carlots. Oregon's base price will be \$1.25 for No. 1 Russett Burbanks sacked carlots, f. o. b. Klamath Falls. Differentials will be determined from this base price for other varieties and other producing centers.
To encourage full planting, regulations will provide that only those potato producers who plant at least 80 and not more than 110 per cent of their potato allotment will be eligible to dispose of their potatoes through government purchases.
The chairman pointed out that the price support program is not aimed toward expanded production in 1942, but rather to assure full planting of the allotted acreage. There have been no increases in total allotments, which are the same as in 1941. Allotments will be established for each producer growing more than three acres of potatoes, and full planting of these allotments will be sufficient to produce 365 million bushels to meet domestic requirements this year. In order to receive their full ACP potato payment, growers must plant at least 80 per cent and not more than 110 per cent of their allotment.

Low prices for the past few years have caused a considerable reduction in potato acreage, the chairman observed. Production has been adequate only because of unusually high yields.
Current potato prices are favorable, but they were relatively low last fall and winter during the heavy marketing period. Without some assurance of price support for this year's crop, growers might further reduce planting, and this could result in an acute shortage of potatoes in 1942, Mr. Coppock said.
Umatilla county was assigned

1,000 acres of potato allotments for the 1942 crop, and the original allotment was assigned to the various potato producers, in Umatilla county in October, 1941. However, when we completed our food for defense sign-up last fall, we found that the allotments in many cases were not properly distributed according to the farmers' intentions of planting for 1942. We have made the necessary adjustment, and have submitted the corrections to our state AAA office for approval, and as soon as we receive such approval, all potato growers will be notified as to their final allotment for this year's crops.
The rate of payment for potatoes under the 1942 Conservation Program will be 2c per bushel on the allotted acres times the normal yield as set up in the county office. No allotments were set for any producer who intends to plant less than three acres since anyone is allowed to plant and harvest the three acres without penalty.
