BOMB'S MISSION STARTS AT U. O. D.

This is the bomb run.

Formations of silvery B-17 Flying Fortresses cut through the cold dangerous air of the sub-stratosphere, weaving through a deadly pattern of flak bursts. The cross-hairs of the bomb sight are synchronized on a railroad marshaling yard deep in the heart of industrial Germany.

A few minutes of tense waiting that seem like an eternity, and then the familiar "Bombs Away" of the bombardier as his fingers tighten around the bomb release, cascading the sticks of Ordnance bombs down a corridor of space on the last five miles of a journey that began months ago at Umatilla Ordnance Depot here on the home front.

Colonel A. S. Buyers, commanding officer, cited a report he had received from an Eighth Air Force Bomber Station in England to show the various stages that a bomb, possibly one from Umatilla Ordnance Depot, passes through in the United Kingdom before it is dropped from the bomb bay of a Flying Fortress.

A typical bomb may have gone to the 306th Bomb Group at a Flying Fortress station. Explosives arriving at the 306th Group are stored in the bomb dump at an isolated part of the air field. The bombs are immediately inspected by Ordnance experts for damage and flaws.

One night a field order comes in that a mission is scheduled. The first men on the base to go into action are the Ordnance crews. In the dark night their dimly lit trucks and trailers stream silently toward the bomb dump where each squadron Ordnance section loads up with its allotted quota of bombs.

At every dispersal area the explosives are wheeled up to the yawning bomb bays of the heavy bombers, and the delicate, back-breaking job of installing the bombs in the plane begins. Nose and tail fuzes are put on each bomb. The work is tiring and exacting. One slip, one bit of carelessness may mean the sudden explosion of the entire bomb load.

Then in the gray mist that dulls an English morning, the combat crews roll out to their planes to take up battle positions. The air is filled with the roar of racing engines. Slowly the huge four-engined bombers crowd the perimeters and move toward the runway. Take-off flares rockets from the control tower and the Group leader's wheels start down the runway and rise gracefully over the green English countryside.

Tomorrow newspapers will report the mission. The account will tell of the target, damage inflicted and losses. But it isn't a complete report. For the mission really started right here in Umatilla Ordnance Depot.

RATIONING CALENDAR

Processed Foods: Book 4—Blue stamps X5 through B2 valid through March 31; Blue stamps C2 through G2 valid through April 28; Blue stamps H2 through M2 valid through June 2; Blue stamps N2 through S2 valid through June 30; Blue stamps T2 through Z2 valid April 1 through July 31.

Meat, Butter, Cheese: Book 4—Red stamps Q5 through S5 valid through March 31; Red stamps T5 through X5 valid through April 28. Red stamps Y5 through D2 valid through June 2; Red stamps E2 through J2 valid through June 30; Red stamps K2 through P2 valid April 1 through July 31.

Sugar: Book 4—Sugar stamp 35 valid through June 2; New sugar stamp valid May 1.

Shoes: Loose stamps invalid. Book 3: Airplane stamps 1-2-3 now valid.

Gasoline: Coupons not valid unless endorsed. "A" 15 coupons, 4 gallons each, valid through June 21.

Stoves: Apply local board for oil, gas stove certificates.

Wood, Coal, Sawdust: Dealer determines delivery priority from consumer's written statement of annual needs and quantity on hand.

Fuel Oil: Period 1-5 (incl.) coupons valid through August 31. Not more than 79 per cent of season's rations should have been used to date.

Price Control: Refer inquiries and complaints to price clerk at local board.

Rent Control: In areas under Federal rent control, all rented dwelling units must be registered, and changes in tenancy reported.
