Births—March 24th to Mr. and Mrs. Edgar S. Bloom, a boy, Don-

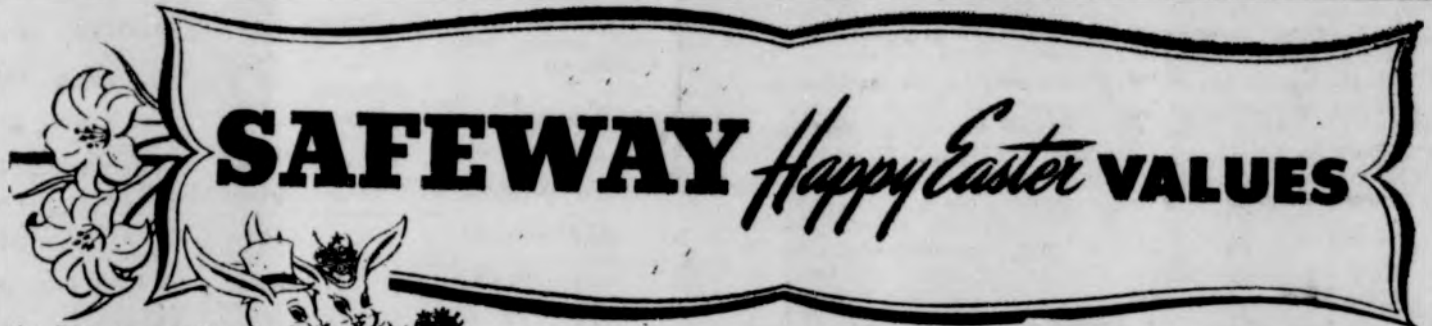
ald Ray; on March 26th to Mr. and Mrs. Fred A. Lenz, a girl, Marilyn Earlene.
