According to a recent announcement from Walter M. Pierce, 2nd Congressional district, Oregon postmasters have established a fine record in recent years. Mr. Pierce feels quite proud of the record made because a good majority of the postmasters have been appointed on his recommendation.

In first-class offices, Oregon stands No. 1 in the nation with an average of 96.65. There are 18 of these offices in Oregon. In the second-class division, such as Hermiston, Oregon ranks No. 7, with a rating of 93.26. In the third-class Oregon rates No. 2. For all classes of offices, Oregon ranks No. 4 with an average of 94.19.
