RESIDENTS URGED TO REGISTER NOW

Throughout the state thousands of voters have been taken off the lists because they have changed their place of residence since the last election and failed to re-register. There are thousands of others, new-comers to Oregon now employed in the various defense projects, who have been here six months or more and are entitled to vote.

To vote in the primary in May, registration must be effected before April 14. For county and state elections in May, voters may register at Mayor F. C. McKenzie's office at the Oregon Hardware & Implement Co., and for the city election at the office of Charles Taylor, recorder.

Primary elections will be held in May when nominations for governor and other state offices and for district and county offices will be made.

ing out of business because of the tire shortage. A survey discloses that there are many garages with welding units, lathes, shapers and grinding machines, all tools that are needed and can be used. Many of the major lumber operators have their own railroad equipment and their mechanics are qualified and equipped to turn out innumerable articles requiring steel and other metals, and they can make gondolas and freight cars now badly needed. Scores of metal working shops scattered all over Oregon are capable of manufacturing something for an airplane. The small foundries, machine shops, plywood plants and some of the pulp mills can do war work.
