ADVANCEMENT FAST IN MARINE CORPS

Vacancies exist in officers' training for marine corps privates and privates first class. Commissions as second lieutenants may be attained through the ranks with a greater speed than ever before known, according to Staff Sergeant Robert E. Lucas of the marine corps recruiting station at Walla Walla.

All applications for enlistment are now being carefully questioned as to educational background and advised that such vacancies exist. Qualifications for officers' training are a college degree, or proficiency in certain subjects, plus being sufficiently under 27 years of age to be commissioned before the approaching birthday.

Men over 30 and under 51 years of age seeking enlistment in the marine corps limited reserve are subject to good news. For the month of April, the quota of limited reservists for this district has been lifted to permit a greater number of young marines a speedy return to combat duty. The assignment now is that of guard duty for the duration of the war at nearby naval bases. Applications should be made at the marine corps recruiting station, room 12, Book Nook building, Walla Walla.
