UMATILLA FARMERS URGED TO VOTE ON WHEAT MEASURE

Every Umatilla county farmer who has more than 15 acres of wheat seeded this year is eligible to vote at the referendum on wheat marketing quotas May 2, according to A. R. Coppock, chairman of the county AAA committee.

In reviewing marketing quota regulations, the chairman pointed out that all persons who have an interest in the wheat crop on an eligible farm may vote at the referendum, this includes wives who own farms jointly with their husbands.

Stressing the importance of every eligible voter casting his ballot the chairman announced that absentee voters and resident voters who will not be in the county on referendum day may vote either by mail or at the county AAA office during the week presiding May 2, beginning Saturday, April 25.

Persons voting by mail may obtain a ballot from the nearest county AAA office. They should mark and sign the ballot and put it in the mails in time to be received by the county office in the county in which the farm is located before 9 p. m., May 2, the chairman said.

AAA FEED WHEAT PROGRAM AID TO SPRING SHORTAGES

The AAA feed wheat program, under which government-held wheat is being released at local loan rates for feeding purposes, has been credited by the Oregon USDA war board with a major contribution toward meeting milk, egg and pork production goals set for the state under the Food for Freedom program.

Reviewing progress of production to date at its April meeting, the board found that the 500 carloads of wheat sold to Oregon farmers under the program had helped relieve a deficiency of feeds created by the late spring and the increased livestock numbers.

The board recommended to the secretary of agriculture that the feed wheat program be continued "as the best means of converting the tremendous wheat surplus into needed

livestock and poultry products, and of alleviating the acute grain storage problem."

FARMERS NEED EXPLOSIVES LICENSE WITH WEED DOPE

Farmers purchasing sodium chlorate for use as a weed killer must first obtain a license from their local explosives licensing agent, the Oregon USDA War board has disclosed, in announcing arrangements to assist farmers in obtaining the necessary license.

The federal explosives act, effective during wartime, requires that persons purchasing explosives or ingredients of explosives first obtain a license, the board pointed out. Sodium chlorate is classed as an ingredient.

New High in Ship Production
