### SUGGESTIONS FOR FARM FOLKS

Farm Security families of Umatilla county have recognized that there is a deficiency of vitamin C in their diet and are planning to make every effort to improve their diet.

Vitamin C is essential for cell activity, blood regeneration—maintaining blood vessels, development of teeth and bone and formation of supporting tissues. The lack of it causes sore gums, a tendency to bruise easily, pallor, weakness and anemia. It cannot be stored in the body, therefore it must be included in every day's food needs.

Tomatoes and citrus fruits are the richest source, and every Food for Victory garden raised by Farm Security families will include enough tomatoes this summer for summer use plus enough for canning and juicing for winter use.

In order to assure a plentiful supply of vitamin C in case the tomato crop should fail, plans have also been made to plant, can and store other fruits and vegetables which are rich in vitamin C and may be substituted for tomatoes. Strawberries are a very rich source and also melons. The latest word is that melons can be put in the cold storage locker. Potatoes, raw cabbage, raw green pepper and turnips may also be included in the menu in such a way that the daily needs for vitamin C may be met.

It will be well for farm families to plant their garden with the idea of providing ample vitamin C for their diet.

### FARMERS NOW ASSURED PUMPING EQUIPMENT QUOTAS

Farmers of Oregon and other Pacific coast states who depend on pumping equipment to supply irrigation water for crops have now been assured quotas for such equipment under a revised war production board order which recognizes for the first time that pumping equipment is essential. Notification of this change has just been received by F. B. Price, assistant dean of agriculture at Oregon State college, who spent some time in Washington with other western representatives urging priorities for irrigation pumping equipment.

Irrigation equipment assigned quotas, ranging from 50 to 132 per cent, include turbine pumps of the smaller sizes and repair parts, centrifugal pumps and repair parts, electric motors for irrigation pumps, and distribution equipment with repair parts. Some other miscellaneous farm machinery was included in the amended order.

tion, County Agent Holt points out.

Farmers will be asked to lend or list fire fighting equipment including shovels, rakes, water buckets and cans, tractors, trucks, plows, spray rigs, hand spray pumps and other material necessary to have available immediately for emergency use.

The Extension Service has assigned Art King, extension specialist in soils, as state leader of the program to devote full time to rural fire protection work for the next three months. He will be assisted by Robert Sterling, assistant in land use planning. It is hoped to have the units organized and functioning by the middle of May.

King recently returned from California where he observed the organization work in progress. More than 2000 local volunteer rural fire units had already been organized in

that state when he was there. In West Umatilla county there will be nine districts organized according to this plan. The leaders and assistants in each of these districts are as follows:

District 1—Upper Butter Creek, Kilkenny to Wurster, Sloan Thomson, Ralph Saylor.

District 2—Lower Butter Creek and Umatilla Meadows, east to Adolph Heyden's, Roy Temple, Harry Andrews.

District 3—Balance Umatilla Meadows, Heyden's to Echo, Hawley Bean, Adolph Heyden.

District 4—All Stanfield Project, Charles Herrick, Harry McCormick.

District 5—Columbia District North and East Woodring's corner, A.H. Cable, Henry Kopacz.

District 6—All North Hill district, Bill Kik, Emmett Cooney.

District 7—South Township Line and South and West Umatilla River to Woodring corner, Harry Kelley, James Omohundro.

District 8—All Westland District, Floyd Laird, Guy Knapp.

District 9—East and West of Umatilla, Walt Bray, Irvin Chapman.

There will be a meeting of these leaders Friday, April 24 at 8 p. m. at the American Legion hall in Hermiston. At this meeting Carl Ewing, Forest Service, Mr. Peltier, Grazing Service, Walter Holt, County Agent, and Buck Lieuallen, head of the county Civilian Defense, will be present to explain, as it is being outlined, to leaders of these fire fighting units.

### YOUNG ANIMALS MAKE POOR PETS

Individuals finding cub bear or fawn deer in the woods apparently deserted by their mothers are requested to refrain from picking up such animals and taking them home as pets. Not only is this unlawful but in most cases the young have only been temporarily left behind while the doe deer or mother bear has gone off for food.

While the young animals make nice pets, both deer and bear when grown often become dangerous to human life while held in captivity and eventually have to be killed.

### SHEEP RAISERS TO MEET TUESDAY
