SOLDIER MAIL RULES LISTED

The U. S. postal department has issued instructions to patrons of the mails who are writing and sending parcels to boys in the service. Parcels should not exceed 11 pounds in weight, be more than 18 inches in length, or more than 42 inches in length and girth combined. These regulations do not apply to mail for Canadian or Mexican points.

It is also urged that not more than one parcel per week be sent to a soldier in the service. According to post office officials, these steps are necessary in order to relieve space accommodations aboard ship. Perishable goods are also prohibited.
