Whatever may become of the aluminum ingot plants, from Tacoma to Troutdale, after the war, the project nesting at the base of Grand Coulee dam will be shut down and abandoned when victory comes to the banners of the United Nations. And this is another reason for locating the plant at the damsite.

Renewed appeals are being sent from the northwest to the maritime commission for wooden barges with which to relieve the gasoline and fuel oil shortage. A northwest naval architect of many years' experience promises to submit drawings for a leakless wooden barge. Tugs also would be of wood and Scotch marine boilers can be built in Oregon without any difficulty.

ister. Your declaration is under oath and must include all sugar on hand in any form—white, brown, confectioners', lump, sugar made up into syrup, etc. You may estimate the weight as nearly as you can. Sugar in syrup is also estimated by weight in its liquid form. Under present regulations you will be allowed to keep and use the sugar you declare, but only on the rationing basis of one-half pound per week per person.

If I have more than 6 pounds per person in the house do I register and get a ration book?

Under present regulations, if you have more sugar in your possession than 6 pounds per person (2 pounds allowed, plus 4 excess) you will not be given a war ration book at the time of registration. Your registration will be filed. You should then use your excess sugar at the rationing rate—one-half pound per person per week. When your supply being used at this rate, is down to about 2 pounds of sugar per person, you may apply at your local rationing board for your war rationing book.

**COMPETENT TYPISTS ARE AWARDED**

Congratulations are in order for the following typing students who have written successfully the Competent Typist Test in the March GREGG WRITER and have received their awards. Phyllis Sires' score was highest, 66 with one error; Dorothy Knox's rate was second high, 61,

with four errors. These girls received certificates "in recognition of superior skill in typing."

Competent Typist pins, small gold pins with the letters "C" and "T" on them were given to those students who typed 50 words a minute with five errors or less. The following students have earned their pins: Phyllis Sires, Dorothy Knox, Dola Mae Daugherty, and Florence Kowitz. Certificates were received by Wanda Dunning, whose score was 46, Barbara Connor, 45, and Thelma Holmquist, 43.

The International Rules for checking timed writes are used, and no test is sent in for award if it contains more than five errors. March copy is accepted April 25, and a number of the other students' tests are being mailed this week. Announcement of their awards will be made later.

**PARTNERSHIP FORMS FOR FATHER-SON TEAMS AVAILABLE**

"The aforesaid father and son hereby form a partnership for the sole purpose of operating a farm business on the following described real estate . . . and on any other land which said partners may agree to rent for farming purposes."

This is the introductory statement to one of three proposed father-son partnership agreement forms now available through the extension service of Oregon State college. The forms have been issued to supplement extension circular 379, which describes father-son partnership agreements and their advantages in maintaining businesslike relationships on family farms.

The forms have been prepared by the farm management department of the college in three kinds to meet the varying conditions. Form one is the labor and management share type of agreement, where the father furnishes all of the owned farm property. Form two is the personal property share agreement, which is adapted to situations where the son owns part of the livestock, equipment, and other personal property but owns none of the real estate.

Form three, known as the real estate and personal property share type of agreement, is for situations where the son owns a half interest in the personal property plus a part interest in the real estate. The blank forms also include instructions on how to adapt them to individual situations.

The use of such agreements will go far toward stimulating and maintaining greater interest on the part of young men who remain on their fathers' farms, and in preventing future misunderstandings, says W. L. Teutsch, assistant director of the extension service.
