The next period will begin May 31 and continue to June 13. News in Portland papers this week indicated that consumers could purchase five pounds per person for canning purposes but to date no verification of this plan has been received here. Grocery stores will absolutely not sell any sugar unless the customer produces a stamp for same.
