Louis Bunnell expects to leave the local hospital Friday after having spent the past five weeks there with an injured foot.

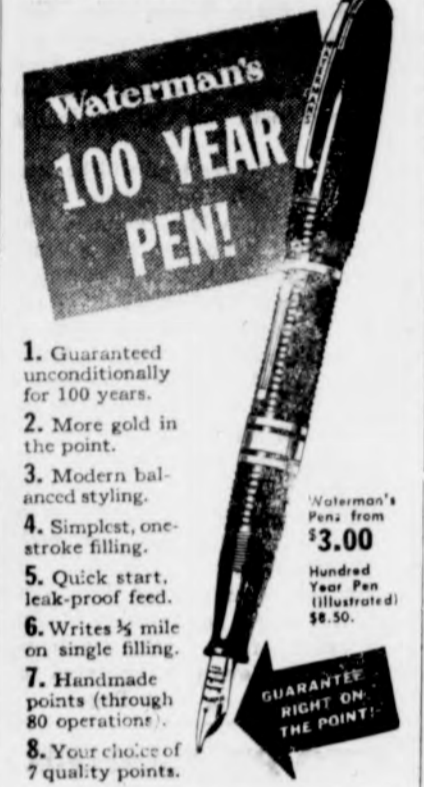

FARMERS PUT OUT GRASS FIRE

A grass fire, first big one of the season in this section, was combatted by farmers and helpful neighbors northeast of Cold Springs reservoir Wednesday morning, starting about 10:30. The fire was brought under control shortly before noon with very little damage resulting.

A double alarm was sounded in Hermiston and a radio station broadcast the news. Within a short time a delegation from Hermiston made the trip to the reservoir but turned back when informed that the danger was past. Apparently the fire started north of the bombing range and continued northeastward, fanned by a fair breeze.

FARMERS DO WORK TOGETHER

Cooperation is expected to pay dividends for two Umatilla county farmers and conserve vital war materials by organization of the G & M Spreader Service through the community and cooperative services section of the Farm Security administration, announces William S. Bennett, county FSA supervisor, Umatilla Cooperative Creamery building, Hermiston.

"Bernard E. Getchell and Harold G. McCulley are cooperating in joint ownership and use of a manure spreader," Bennett said. "The spreader is expected to reduce operating costs of the cooperators and will be available for some work for other farmers in the community. Getchell will act as manager-treasurer." Although funds for the remainder

of the current fiscal year ending June 30 are exhausted, applications for cooperative services can be accepted where funds will not be needed prior to July 1.

OLD - FASHIONED REVIVAL SOON

View now taken by WPB's power division is that there is no power now left in the Grand Coulee-Bonneville dams; that it is all contracted for J. A. Krug, formerly with TVA and now power advisor for WPB, says that every kilowatt in the northwest will be taken by next December. He says that steel mills, rolling mills, fabricating plants, shipyards and airplane factories will absorb it all—a statement which has been challenged and taken up by northwest senators with David Nelson, WPB boss.
