MORE STOCK,
LESS HAY IS
OUTLOOK NOW

Surplus hay supplies in Oregon have been pretty well cleaned up compared with a year ago, and farm prices for hay are several dollars a ton higher, according to data in a report on the agricultural situation just released by the Oregon State college extension service. The report also points out that the number of hay-consuming animals has increased and that meadows and pastures in Oregon are not as good as a year ago although above average.

In the country as a whole there is an increase in the number of hay-consuming animals, also, and hay stocks are smaller than a year ago. New hay crop prospects were nearly as good as last year on May 1 and above average generally, although not too good in much of the east.

Feed grain production prospects were about normal, but carry-over stocks are smaller and more grain-consuming animals are on hand. The amount of feed grain in relation to animals may be 5 to 10 per cent smaller next winter. On the other hand, the wheat crop will be even larger than expected a month ago and rye is expected to yield unusually well.

Prices for animal products are still relatively high in relation to feeds, according to data in the report. For example, in the country as a whole the purchasing value of beef cattle was 131 per cent of parity at mid-April, and milk 100, compared with hay at 62 per cent of parity and corn at 82. Prices for hay and corn are higher in relation to prices for beef and milk a year ago, however, and crop prospects suggest that the price differentials will become narrower.

The outlook report, available from any extension office, also includes an outline of general crop prospects. Prospects indicate a planting of three per cent more late potatoes than last year, a moderate increase of commercial vegetables for market, and an increase of 29 and 26 per cent respectively for tomatoes and green peas for canning.

LABOR SHORTAGE
EXPECTED HERE

In keeping with the general condition about the country, farmers and fruit growers of the Hermiston section are beginning to feel the shortage of common laborers. Hay hands, in particular, are not available and growers are fearing a loss unless something can be done.

Requests for berry pickers have been made during the past few days. A great deal of this type of labor is now available and members of families who are capable of doing this work are urgently requested to get in touch with the proper authorities.

STANDARD OIL TO
OPEN BOND DRIVE

H. D. Collier, president of the Standard Oil company of California, yesterday launched a campaign to enlist 10 per cent of the company's total payroll in the purchase of War Savings Bonds.

Mr. Collier, speaking from Washington, over the Pacific Red Network Sunday morning, addressed the 18,000 employees of Standard Oil Company of California and Standard Stations, Inc., urging them to take part in the formation of a "War Savings Army" pledged to invest 10 per cent of their earnings in War Savings Bonds through payroll deduction plan.

The Standard Oil Company of California, he said, will contribute \$15,000 in War Savings Stamps to those groups of employees that sign up 100 per cent for 10 per cent deductions. "I am proud to report," Mr. Collier said, "that almost 1800 men from Standard Oil Company of California and Standard Stations, Inc., are already in the military services, and that more are joining the colors every day. These men, who have worked side by side with you, know that it is an all-out war. They are giving all their support 100 per cent. Cleansers Classified;
Dry or Liquefying Type

Today's many excellent cleansers are sharply classified into two types: one for the dry skin; one for the oily.

Best for the dry skin is the cold cream—full-bodied but soft, fairly fluffy or whipped-to-a-froth. This type of cream usually contains the rich oils that help to counteract dryness.

Better for the oily skin is the liquefying type of cleanser which is translucent and which melts almost at the touch of your finger, and contains nothing that will add greasiness to a skin.

But the way you apply a cream is important. To cleanse your face thoroughly it must be filmed with cream, again and again, until your cleansing tissue shows no soil.

Auxiliary-aid to your cleansing cream is your softening cream, which, according to our teacher, every girl needs to use after she reaches the ripe old age of 20. It's your best outward defense against Time's unremitting attacks on smooth skin surfaces. Here again your choice of a cream depends upon the nature of your skin.

If your skin is the dry kind, one of the emollients that are rich in oils helps to keep it soft, pliant and more resistant to lines or furrows. But where the skin already has a good supply of oil, one of the emollients with astringents in it can do much to keep down the shine.

You can get double value from any of your creams or emollients if you will always apply it with brisk, upward massage motions, using your hands symmetrically. Leaving your emollient on overnight is good, but there is no more advantage to be gained from a heavy mask of cream than from an almost invisible film.

New Invention Muffles

Static; Army Buys Some

A revolutionary radio receiver that is said to eliminate all interfering noise has been perfected by Karl E. Pierson, Los Angeles radio engineer. Army tests indicate the receiver has solved the problem of efficient communication between military planes.

"The new receiver," according to Dr. Lee De Forest, "father of radio," brings in programs and signals through static which even the most advanced of modern receivers fail to make intelligible."

Pierson, the inventor, is chief engineer of Pierson De Lane, Inc., of Los Angeles. His receiver, in its preliminary form, he revealed, first proved its possibilities at the time of Amelia Earhart's last flight. "I'm now at liberty to say," he explained, "that I definitely did pick up signals from the Earhart plane after it was down."

The government has ordered some of the new receivers and Pierson expects eventually to manufacture them for public use in his Los Angeles factory.

Automatic Gear Shifting

Harold E. Churchill, automobile engineer, predicts motorists soon won't need to know there ever was such a thing as a gear-shift lever. Ultimately, he believes, the engine itself will shift gears automatically without the attention or knowledge of the driver. This automatic change in the gear ratio will occur when demanded by the speed and pull of the engine. As a matter of fact, according to Churchill, this type of shift already has been built and tested. But the engineer admits he is not fully satisfied with the results. For example, he says, the mechanism in its present form sometimes upsets drivers due to a very frequent automatic shifting in heavy traffic. But it is only a question of a year or two before such problems will be solved.

Records Are Delicate

Phonograph records are delicate and sensitive. A collection can be a lifetime thing if a little knowledge is added to the desire to possess and keep. The records made today are pressed from resins, either natural or synthetic, while they are plastic. Various fillers are incorporated to give the mass body and control. These fillers increase the wear resistance, but they can't insure against bad treatment. They are made of slate, various clays, metal oxides and silicates, all in a relatively coarse form and imparting surface noises. One manufacturer uses pulverized marble, but the usual formula contains shellac, resin, manila gum, calcium carbonate, sienna filler, bone black and carbon black.

Thanksgiving Day

Since 1621 Thanksgiving day had been designated by community leaders, village mayors, and finally by governors, but the first national observance of the day followed the proclamation of George Washington from his New York headquarters, October 3, 1789, at the request of both houses of congress that he, as President, "recommend to the people of the United States a day of public thanksgiving and prayer, to be observed by acknowledging with grateful hearts the many signal favors of Almighty God, especially by affording them an opportunity peaceably to establish a form of government for their safety and happiness."

STEEL BAN HITS
FARM MATERIALS
AFTER 3 MONTHS

The war production board's recent action prohibiting the use of iron and steel in the manufacture of more than 400 items, will affect many articles widely used in agriculture, the Oregon USDA war board reports.

The order provides that for the next 90 days, manufacturers may make up to 75 per cent of the average monthly 1941 production of the specified items. After that period, no more iron and steel can be used to manufacture the items named.

Among the iron and steel articles affected by the order, and which farmers will have to do without for the "duration," after present supplies are exhausted are:

Cattle stanchions, chicken crates, chick feeders, corn cribs, culverts, feed troughs, fence posts, grain storage bins, silos, dipping and watering tanks, storage tanks, wagon bodies and wheelbarrows.

Metal roofing and siding also will no longer be available, except for maintenance and repair work, the war board reports.

Oregon's plan to conserve farm machinery through encouraging the joint use and ownership of equipment has received nationwide recognition, the state USDA war board reports.

An outline of the plan, developed by FSA technicians at the request of the state war board, has been sent to all state USDA war boards in the nation in a memorandum from Fred Wallace, special war board assistant to the secretary of agriculture.

Wallace's memo cited Oregon's plan as an effective program to obtain maximum efficient use of farm machinery.
