cations for canning or/and preserving. 17. What approximate proportion of your canning for the entire year 1942 does this application cover?

The maximum amount which will be allowed may not exceed one pound of sugar per four quarts of finished canned fruits and one pound per annum per person for use in preparing preserves, jams, jellies or fruit butters. The family or individual will be limited to the canning of the quantity of fruit which the board deems

reasonable for the family applying. There will be every effort to put this on an equitable basis, with consideration of the size and ages in the family, its past practices in canning, the fruit available to it, etc.

Applications will be accepted only from those who have registered for their war ration book. Those who have registered but have not received their books on account of their having excess sugar, may register and receive an allotment for canning sugar."

There's nothing elaborate or fanciful about the modern methods of preparing and cooking vegetables. On the contrary, the new way is much simpler—as you'll discover when you read these hints that come from the Safeway Homemakers' Bureau).

1. To start, always buy the freshest, finest vegetables available. The older they are, the less attractive they become, and they lose some of their vitamins, too.

2. Wash vegetables quickly—but don't let them soak in water, or you'll wash away minerals and vitamins. Put greens in a covered container, wrap other vegetables closely in waxed paper; and store in the refrigerator until ready to use.

3. Don't pare, cut or shell fresh vegetables until just time to cook or serve, because vitamins escape once cut surfaces are exposed to air.

4. Cook quickly, as short a time as possible, using as little water as possible, and using cooking water when it is palatable.

Quick cooking means less vitamin loss, less color change. To speed the cooking, add vegetables to rapidly boiling water; cook covered.

5. Green vegetables (to keep their color) and strong flavored vegetables (to modify their flavor) should be cooked uncovered, in slightly more water than other vegetables.

6. Serve vegetables as soon as possible, to get full benefit in goodness as well as nutrition. Overcooking lessens attractiveness, sacrifices vitamins and minerals, and may cause unpleasant color changes.

TRIAL PLANTINGS ATTEMPTED HERE

Pacific coast oil refiners have expressed interest in processing trial plantings of new farm crops grown here for essential oils used in paints and varnishes, according to H. W. Derry, manager of the new industries department of Pacific Power & Light company.

Derry recently made arrangements with the National Farm Chemurgic council to secure castor bean, Russian mammoth sunflower, safflower and coriander seeds, all sources of oils that were imported from foreign countries before the outbreak of the war. A. M. Thrasher, local P. P. & L. manager, aided in arranging trial plantings in the Hermiston area this spring.
