### NO FIREWORKS ON THE FOURTH, SAYS GOVERNOR

Sale or use of fireworks, pyrotechnics, or other forms of combustible explosives that may be used as signal devices or as simulated gun fire has been prohibited throughout the state of Oregon under an edict issued by Lieut. General John L. DeWitt, commanding the Western Defense Area and Fourth Army.

Under executive order of the president, General DeWitt's orders during the present emergency carry the same force and effect as laws upon the statute books.

Governor Sprague is directing the state police, sheriffs and local law-enforcing bodies to detain any person who refuses to comply with this edict and turn such person over to the military authorities, if local ordinances do not cover the situation.

With the spectre of fire threatening our vast forests, as well as cities and towns, Gov. Sprague feels certain that every patriotic man, woman and child in Oregon will comply cheerfully with this wartime restraint and that drastic action will not be required.

It should be noted that the sale or use of fireworks, firecrackers, and even cap pistols is prohibited throughout the entire state, in cities, towns, as well as in all areas outside incorporated cities. Customary roadside

stands, usually located just beyond the limits of a city, cannot be operated under General DeWitt's directive. General DeWitt's order against sale of fireworks applies to holdover stock now in the hands of dealers or the public, as well as new merchandise.

coupon book with the vehicle in the securing of gasoline.

Collector Maloney said that to guard against loss or theft, it has been suggested that, when affixing the stamps, the vehicle owner should dampen the windshield rather than the adhesive side of the stamp. Another effective method is to brush clear varnish over the stamp after it has been affixed. These methods have been recommended to keep the stamp intact upon the windshield. As an additional precaution, it is suggested that each motor vehicle owner should make a record of the serial number which appears on the Use Tax Stamp in order that there may be some means of identification in connection with gasoline rationing in the event the stamp should become lost. In Oregon, all stamps are required to be placed in the upper left hand corner of the inside of the windshield.

Every owner of a motor vehicle which is used upon the highway should call at his local post office, or at the office of the Collector of Internal Revenue, 210 Custom House, Portland, Oregon, and secure a \$5.00 use tax stamp and affix it to his vehicle on or before July 1, 1942. The various post offices will sell the stamps over the counter for cash only, and no mail order business with respect thereto will be conducted by the post offices. When stamps are ordered from the Collector of Internal Revenue, Portland, Oregon, payment may be made by post office

## Coal Storage Recommendations

Now that coal is being rapidly stored in response to the appeal of our government that consumers "buy and store coal now while men and transportation facilities are available", inquiries are frequently made as to safe and unwise storage methods. It appears appropriate for the members of the Utah Coal Operators Association to advise their customers that by the following of these few simple recommendations the storage of coals mined and marketed by them can be safely and economically accomplished:

- (1) All storage bins should be cleaned and kept free of: Sticks, rags, paper, burlap, waste and all types of rubbish.
- (2) When slack coal is to be stored in bins the coal should be dry when stored and should not be placed where water can drain onto or through the coal pile.
- (3) Slack coal should not be piled over, around or in contact or near contact with hot water or steam pipes or warm air ducts, or against chimneys or furnace walls.
- (4) After all of the slack coal that is to be stored has been placed in the bin, top of coal should be leveled from wall to wall.
- (5) When slack coal is to be stored outside upon the ground, a site should be chosen where drainage is away from the coal pile, but with no open drains under the pile at any point. Ground should be cleared of weeds, brush, trees, leaves and refuse. Coal should not be piled higher than 12 feet, and the storage pile should not be wider than 25 feet at the base. The length of such pile may be unlimited. The top of the pile should be leveled so as to avoid hills & valleys.
- (6) The storage of prepared sizes of coals, including Lump, Stove and Nut, may be made in inside bins or in piles in the open with practically no loss in heating or burning value.

been appealing to WPB, which says it realizes the tin shortage will result in much waste of fruit but declines to modify the order; it suggests that growers dehydrate their prunes.  
Farmers are trying to find a solu-

tion for warehousing their wheat, and Office of Defense Transportation is in a similar boat. War materials consigned to the United Nations are piling up at ports waiting for ships. War department is reaching out for warehouse space and ODT is creating warehouse pools in the northwest. War materials—tanks, planes and guns—are being produced faster than ships, notwithstanding some yards can turn out a cargo carrier in 60 days. Despite records made in the shipyards, submarines are sending so many merchantmen to the bottom that maritime commission is scarcely duplicating the tonnage lost.
