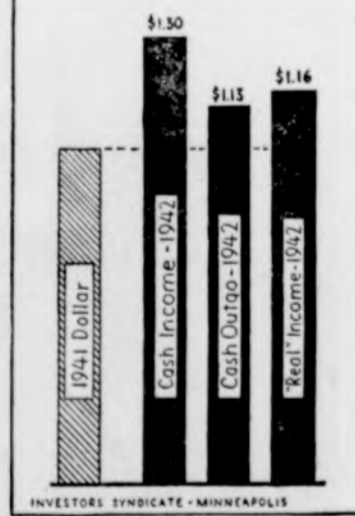

American Income Rises 16 Cents; Living Costs Up 13 Cents Over 1941

PURCHASING POWER
APRIL, 1941 vs APRIL, 1942



THE above chart, showing how the average American fared in national income changes in the last twelve months, is based on the monthly consumers' study of Investors Syndicate of Minneapolis. The American Public in April had a "real income" of \$1.16, or an increase of sixteen cents on the dollar over the same 1941 month. This "real income" is not a subtraction of cash income and expenditures but an average relative of these figures designed to show how living costs affect adjusted income dollars.

Cash income of the American Public in April was \$1.30 for every \$1 a year earlier. This gain of thirty cents on the dollar resulted from the following changes per dollar: wages up thirty-nine cents; and salaries twenty-one cents; and other income was up thirty-three cents on the dollar. Investment income at 98 cents was down 2 cents. Rents in April were up four cents over a year ago. Food was up twenty-two cents, and clothing was up twenty-one cents. Miscellaneous items were eleven cents higher than in April, 1941.
