GRASSHOPPERS DO DAMAGE

Cool weather seems to have slowed down the grasshoppers on most fronts, according to reports received from farmers residing about this area. East of Umatilla there has been considerable damage to berry bushes and flowers. The most serious damage, however, seemed to center in the Butter Creek area where Gaylord Madison is reported to have lost about 15 acres of rye for seed. The hoppers crawl up the stem and concentrate on the head. The damaged grain in some instances can be used for hay.

The poison mixing station in that district is being maintained and bait is spread at intervals. Lesser damage is reported in the Columbia district and east of Stanfield.

in the matter of workmen's insurance. A proposal is a bill to force all employers to insure through the State Industrial Accident Commission.

Another proposal is to make the state or cities pay for the health examinations now required of all culinary workers.

The semi-annual labor parley also

sees danger in the federal proposal to "freeze" workers. No change is desired in the present arrangement which clear thousands of defense and cantonment workers through labor hiring halls.
