POWER COMPANY MEN VOLUNTEER FOR FOREST WORK

Pacific Power & Light Co. men have volunteered their help to the forest service and during the 1942 fire season will serve as auxiliaries to help protect the forests against fire and sabotage, according to Art Thrasher, local manager.

C. O. Lindh, assistant regional forester for Oregon and Washington, has expressed his appreciation of the utility's assistance and has asked the company's representatives to work closely with state and federal protective authorities in their various districts.

The company's extensive private telephone system, carried on power transmission lines through a number of remote areas, is expected to be particularly useful in reporting fire information, Thrasher pointed out.

Company service crews and transmission line patrols are trained and equipped to handle small fires near lines during their normal course of duty. Thrasher said. In case of fires too big to handle alone, they will communicate directly with proper forest protection officials in their areas. They also will watch for and report promptly all suspicious persons in forested areas.
