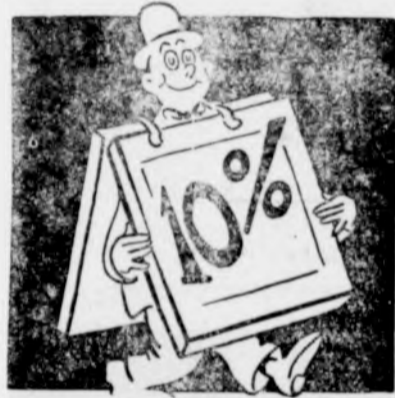

TRY THIS QUICK SUMMER DESSERT



Lady Baltimore Icebox Cake
Broadcast by: Mary Lee Taylor, July 16

- 3/4 cup Pet Milk No. 2 can sliced peaches*
- 1/2 cup water
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 package orange-flavored gelatin
- 8 Maraschino cherries, quartered
- 1 1/2 cups diced sponge cake
- 6 finger-like strips sponge cake

Chill milk until icy cold. Drain peaches and save juice. There should be 1/2 cup juice. If not, add water. Heat slowly to boiling a mixture of peach juice, water and salt. Add gelatin and stir until dissolved. Chill until mixture begins to thicken. Meanwhile, dice 3/4 cup peaches. Combine with quartered cherries and diced cake. Then fold into chilled gelatin mixture. Whip chilled milk with rotary egg beater, or electric beater at high speed, until stiff. Fold into chilled gelatin mixture. Line an oiled mold holding about 6 cups with remaining 3/4 cup sliced peaches and the strips of cake. Fill with gelatin mixture. Chill until firm. Serves 6.

*1 1/2 cups sliced, fresh peaches may be used if 1/2 cup water is substituted for the peach juice.
