TERTELING BUSY IN SOUTH DAKOTA

In a letter recently received by Mrs. Otto Pierce from her daughter Marion, who is with J. A. Terteling & Sons in South Dakota, Marion states that there is a regular city built within the boundary lines of the Ordnance Depot there. There is a general store, bowling alley, theatre with the latest pictures, playground with a supervisor for children of defense workers, and the employees have organized baseball, badminton and volley ball teams, and boxing bouts. There are also housing facilities for all the workers within the area.

In a talk given by Mr. Terteling on the Fourth of July, where they say he spent several hundred dollars on a huge fireworks display, he stated that 1000 more workers, both men and women, were needed to complete the work on time, and that all employees should write home and invite their relatives and friends to the Black Hills to work.

Mr. Terteling is using women in every job possible throughout the depot. Marion, who has been there for several months, enjoys her work very much.
