Henry Morgenthau Jr., Secretary of the Treasury, today made public the official War Bond Quotas by States for the month of July, which places the nation on a Billion-dollar-a-month basis to aid in meeting the War cost. The above table also gives May War Bond sales in the various states in comparison to the May Quotas. (June sales by states will be available for publication shortly.) The percentage of Quotas range from 71.3 percent above quota in Utah, to 22.6 percent below the quota in Montana, but puts the nation as a whole above the \$600,000,000 total May quota. Vulnerable Alaska and Hawaii led all states in sale of War Bonds on quota basis.

"Everybody, every pay day ten percent" is the Treasury slogan which is expected to place one of the attractive new window stickers in every American home. We're Buying at Least 10% reads the sticker, printed in the national colors. The new window stickers and the new "10%" label button, which indicates the wearer is investing at least ten percent of his income in War Bonds every pay day, are yardsticks of patriotism in the War Bond drive.

**605 MATTRESSES IN THIS COUNTY COMPLETES WORK**

Umatilla county's mattress and comforter making program is now complete. Work has just been finished in the Ukiah district, the last center to begin and to finish the work.

A total of 605 mattresses were

made throughout the county, and 514 comforters, according to Myrtle Carter, home demonstration agent.

Work in the Pendleton district, which included Pilot Rock, Cayuse and Rieth, closed last week with thirty comforters being made.

The largest center in the county was Pleasant View, producing a total of 148 mattresses and 107 comforters. Hermiston made 135 mattresses and 124 comforters. The working center in this district was held at the Columbia hall. At Weston, 94 mattresses and 90 comforters were completed. Eighty-eight mattresses and 76 comforters were completed at the Stanfield center, 83 mattresses and 65 comforters from the Umapine working center, and 26 mattresses and 20 comforters at Ukiah.

The value of the mattress is equal to a \$37.50 commercial made mattress, but the cost to the person making it is only one dollar, which is used for miscellaneous items.

Fifty-eight leaders assisted in the work throughout the county. All work on their part was entirely voluntary, and much of the success of the program was due to their fine cooperation and assistance, states Mrs. Carter. Chairmen of the various centers are as follows:

Hermiston, Mrs. H. G. McCulley; Stanfield, Mrs. Ed Brown; Weston, Mrs. L. I. O'Harra; Pleasant View, Mrs. Perry Clark; Umapine, Mrs. Ray Records; Pendleton, Mrs. Pat Cassidy; Ukiah, Mrs. L. G. Huston.

A total of 3962 people took part in the mattress project. The work requires four people at least a full day to complete one mattress. Two families worked together in the making of each mattress.

Stanfield centers were Mrs. H. J. Ott, Mrs. H. A. Wilson, Mrs. Percy H. Corman, Mrs. Bernard E. Getchel, Mrs. Margaret Blahn, Mrs. R. H. Stockard, Mrs. Mabel Weeks and Mrs. Wesley Townsend. The Stanfield leaders were Mrs. Jesse Anson, Mrs. Jack Lawrence, Mrs. C. Tilley and Mrs. Roy Attebury.

**4-H SHOWS BILLED ON REDUCED SCALE THIS YEAR**

Plans for exhibiting 4-H club products despite the cancellation of the state fair, the Pacific International and many of the county fairs have been virtually completed, assuring that efforts of some 25,000 youngsters will not go unrewarded so far as competitive prizes are concerned, announces H. C. Seymour, state club leader in the Oregon State college extension service.

Here is about the way the lineup looks: In the counties such as Multnomah where county fairs will be held, the 4-H club exhibits will be included as usual. In counties where no county fair is being held this year the 4-H clubs will hold community exhibits in centers convenient to the most members. From the top exhibits in these community shows, county winners will be picked by extension workers or other judges in classifications where county winners are important.

Members of livestock clubs producing fat stock, including those in beef, lamb and pig projects, will take their fat stock as usual to the Salem fair grounds on September 9. The animals will be judged the next day and sold at auction September 11. It is pointed out that this will involve no extra transportation as the fat stock must be marketed anyway. No breeding stock will be shown.

Meanwhile the winning county exhibits in home economics and similar projects will be sent to Salem for judging but will not be accompanied by the 4-H club members. The only members going to Salem will be those

in fat stock projects. Arrangements have also been tentatively made for those 4-H club members from this and other states who normally send fat stock to the Pacific International. Arrangements are being made to handle such stock at the Union Stockyards under a plan somewhat similar to that provided at Salem.

Best demonstration teams will be selected in each county by the workers there, with scores sent in to the state office. State judges will then visit the counties which apparently have the best teams and will select state winners in those fields such as dairy production and dairy food demonstrations where national competition is provided.

"We may have to give and take a bit under this arrangement because obviously the selections cannot be as accurate in all cases as under normal procedure," said Seymour. "We intend to do the best we can, however, and believe that the results will be satisfactory in view of the wartime difficulties involved."
