Corn Fritters
Broadcast by: **Mary Lee Taylor, July 30**

1 1/2 cups prepared biscuit flour*
2 tablespoons sugar
2 well beaten eggs
1/4 cup Pet Milk

2 1/4 cups drained, whole kernel corn, freshly cooked or canned (No. 2 can)

Heat 2 inches of vegetable shortening or lard in kettle or heavy saucepan to 360° F., or until a 1-inch cube of bread will brown in 55 seconds. Meanwhile, put flour and sugar in mixing bowl. Mix together eggs and milk. Add to flour, all at once, mixing quickly but thoroughly. Fold in drained corn. Drop by teaspoons into hot fat and fry a few at a time until brown. Drain on unglazed paper. Serve at once with tomato cream sauce if desired. Makes 3 dozen.

*To Substitute All-Purpose Flour for Prepared Biscuit Flour, sift together into bowl 1 1/2 cups sifted all-purpose flour, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 3/4 teaspoon salt and 2 tablespoons sugar. With pastry blender, 2 knives or fork, work 3 tablespoons cold shortening into flour mixture. Then proceed as directed above.
