ECHO NEWS ITEMS

Practically all the wheat farmers west of Echo have completed harvesting. Charles Bartholomew will finish cutting the last of this week and he will probably be the last one to have his outfit in the field. The large crop on the Vogler lands, estimated at about 40,000 sacks, is now being hauled to Echo and stored in the Pacific Coast Elevator company houses. As an indication that this is really an unusual season, Charles Bartholomew of Little Butter Creek reports that stream to be still carrying a considerable flow of water, a condition that has not happened in August during the past 20 years. As a con-

sequence Little Butter Creek farmers are harvesting an unusually large hay crop.

Storage space is being rapidly filled with wheat in all the Echo public warehouses. Charles Reese of Echo Flour Mills reports that the warehouses at the mill are now full, the last load being received there Wednesday. At the former Echo garage, now used for grain storage, there is yet room for several days of hauling.

At the Pacific Coast Elevator company houses near the depot there is space available to take care of all the sacked grain that is expected to be hauled in, according to William Herman, local manager. The north warehouse of this group will be mostly

filled by wheat from the Vogler ranch in the Sand Hollow district. Two carloads of old wheat are to be shipped this week from the south warehouse, the first shipment of the season from this storage house. Most of the grain in these houses is coming from west of Echo in the Butter Creek and Sand Hollow districts.

Mrs. Harry Bartholomew, former Echo lunch counter operator, is now attending a WAAC school at Des Moines, Iowa, according to a letter from Rose Liebbrand to Mrs. J. F. Spinning of Echo.

Harvest operations on the S. F. Coleman and sons lands east of Echo were completed Wednesday. The Coleman crop is being handled in bulk and is stored in an elevator on the farm which was erected last year. Several Past Noble Grand club members went to Pendleton Tuesday evening to meet at the home of Mrs. A. O. Carden.

James McCord, who has been occupying one of the Ed Ward houses near the school, has purchased a tract of land near Hermiston and will move there immediately.
