RABBIT DRIVE KILLS MANY

A concentrated drive on the jack rabbits south of Cold Springs reservoir and east of Stanfield, sponsored by Gene Lear, assistant county agent here, and Harold Dobyns, fish and wild life representative of Pendleton, killed literally hundreds of them Monday night. A check Tuesday morning revealed dead animals over a wide area.

Chopped hay was dosed with a small quantity of strychnine and spread over the infested area. Fear that other animals might be affected was relieved when the check revealed that no damage was done. Anyone having trouble with jack rabbits should get in touch with Mr. Lear. Considerable havoc has been raised in the Stanfield area during the past three weeks.

RALPH MARBLE IN PILOT TRAINING

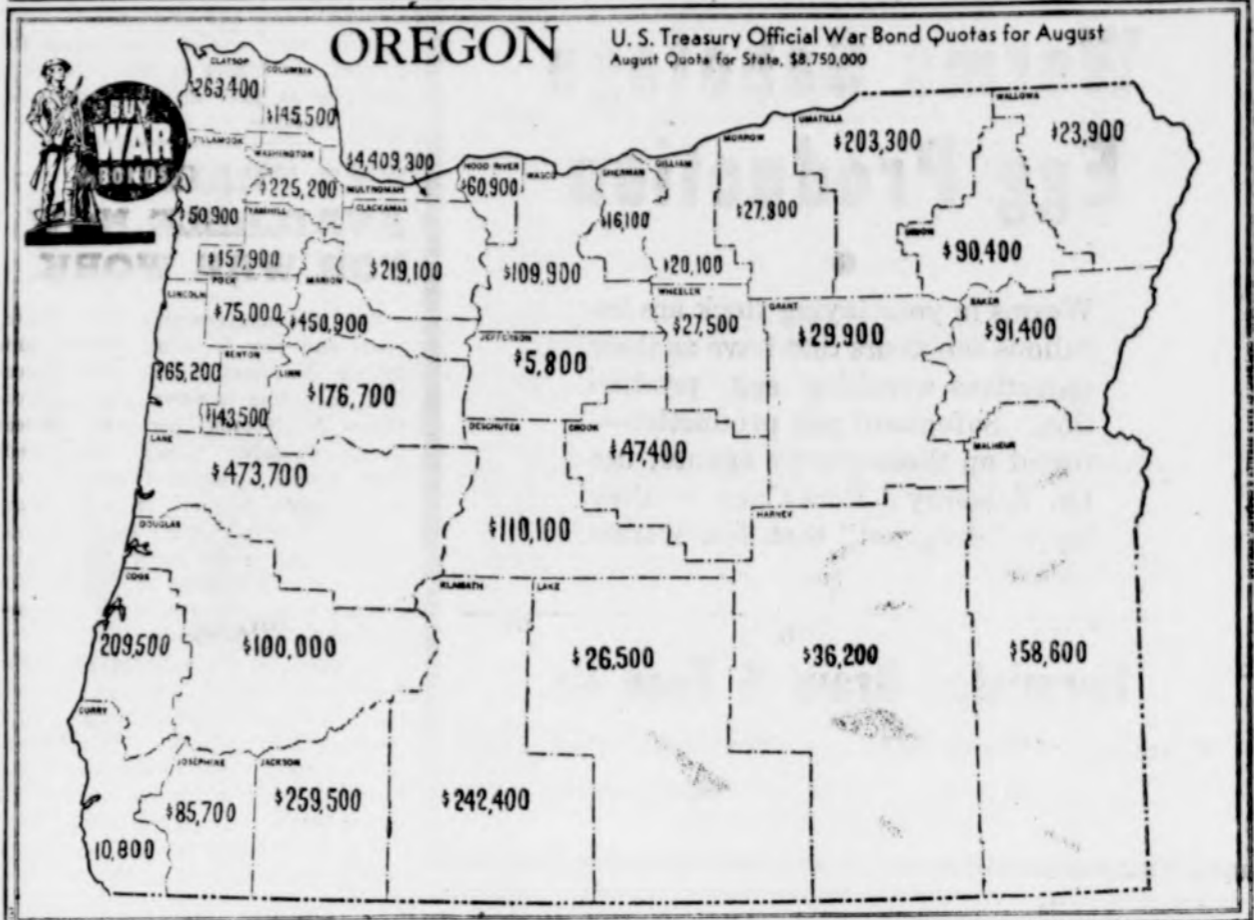

OFFICIAL U. S. TREASURY WAR BOND QUOTAS FOR AUGUST



Washington, D. C., Aug. 10.—Henry Morgenthau, Jr., Secretary of the Treasury, today announced the August War Bond Quotas for the 3,070 counties in the nation totalling \$815,000,000. The August quota for the State of Oregon is \$8,750,000. In arriving at the county quotas for August, as shown in the above map, the Treasury Department took into

consideration major factors affecting incomes which in turn cause significant variations in sales during the twelve-month period. Hereafter actual Bond sales in the various states will be compared with quotas on a cumulative basis. The amount by which sales fall short of or exceed quotas in any month will be added to or subtracted from quotas for future months.

MISS JACKSON TO ATTEND SCHOOL

Miss Jane Jackson, bookkeeper of the Umatilla Electric Cooperative association, will leave Sunday, August 16 for Salem where she will spend the week of August 17 to 21 attending a special rural electrification bookkeepers' school, according to R. L. Woolley, manager of the system. The first four days of the school will be devoted to a study of approved standard accounting methods used in

rural electrification systems throughout the country, and on Friday the sessions will be given over to general operations problems. Manager Woolley will attend the final day of the school.

Member meter reading, a practice that has been used in the Umatilla Electric system for three years, as well as in a great majority of the 788 REA cooperatives throughout the country, is doubly important now with conservation of rubber and gasoline vital to the war effort. Several

hundred thousand miles of driving along the nation's 360,000 miles of REA lines are saved every month through these member-participation practices.

Part of the final session will be given to a discussion of what REA lines have done, and can best do, in the war effort. How to make the best possible use of present facilities and how to prepare and maintain the cooperative's records in such shape that quick adjustments can be made to every war emergency, will be discussed at Friday's session.
