U. S. O. ISSUES JULY REPORT

The following is a brief report for the month of July of the activities of the U.S.O. club in Hermiston:

The total attendance at the USO club for the month of July was 4000. The main events of the July program concerned our USO children. Almost all of the children who take part in the morning activities, are children of defense workers. On July 15th, the children put on a show and a hand-craft exhibit for their families and friends. On July 31st, we took some of our youngsters to Pendleton for an hour's broadcast over Station KWRC. This was a grand experience and thrill for the children and we hope to have another broadcast within the next few months.

The daytime shift of Civilian Guards from the U. O. D. had a good old-time party on July 28th. They provided their own hill-billy music and from their personnel furnished a splendid program for the entertainment of themselves and their guests. We hope to have a special party for the guards once a month in order to entertain the three different shifts which change monthly.

The "Vitality for Victory Dames" brought their husbands and children to the U. S. O. grounds for a pot luck supper one Monday last month. The pot luck supper was followed by a softball game. The V. V. D.'ers had two lectures in July by the County Health Nurse and also their usual physical education activities and two sessions of handcraft work. Quite a few of the women are decorating their cabins with plaster of paris plaques and wood burned pictures, made during the handcraft hour at the U. S. O. club.

Our weekly dances for defense workers, their friends and families are still growing in popularity. During intermission, we have found that many who attend are glad to put on a little program. Recently, we have had three young defense workers who call themselves, "Sons of the Prairie" who have put on an entertainment of singing and yodeling during the intermission.

The month of July saw the first edition of "Turtle Town Tattler" and the "Stanfield Stir-Up". Both little papers developed a great deal of interest in their respective housing units and are serving as a great help in getting people acquainted with their neighbors.

The volunteer committee, appointed at the last U. S. O. council-meeting, has not yet been able to help us in obtaining volunteers in keeping the club open on Sundays. However, through the efforts of our own staff, working from ten to fourteen hours, seven days a week, the club has been open on Sundays from one p. m. to ten p. m. If any of you have any suggestions to make in regard to our program and also in regard to the help of volunteers for Sunday openings, we would be glad to hear from you.

CONTROL OF INFLATION IS DISCUSSED HERE

Ways by which every farm and rural family can help in the nationwide campaign to control inflation and hold down the cost of living were discussed at the leadership training meetings held at Stanfield for the Echo and Stanfield community, and at Hermiston for the Umatilla, Hermiston and Westland communities last week. Present at the meeting were community and neighborhood leaders who will serve for the duration as part of the county and statewide neighborhood leader plan by which emergency information can be carried personally to every farm family.

In expaining the importance of the anti-inflation campaign, which is the first educational job of the neighborhood leaders, Gene Lear, assistant leader, said that the farmer suffers more from inflation in the long run than others because deflation, which always follows inflation, hits him first and hardest. Many remember the "boom or bust" experience of the last world war and want to avoid it this time.

Price control, wage stabilization and the other five items in the seven-point national anti-inflation program will not do the job without the cooperation of individuals and families, the neighborhood leaders were told. The leaders will be supplied with cards to deliver to each family on which can be checked things that family is doing or can do to help.

Among these things each family can do are to pay off or reduce debts, purchase more war bonds and stamps, pay taxes promptly, pay cash for purchases, carry life and property insurance, guard family health, but only what is really needed, obey price and rationing regulations, and help save essential war materials.

All these will help reduce spending now, help hold prices down, and put the family in better condition to meet post-war difficulties if they develop, it was pointed out.

The neighborhood leader plan is sponsored by the O.S.C. Extension Service to meet the wartime emergency needs, Mr. Lear explained. Each neighborhood leader will receive emergency information from
