CREDITS GIVEN FOR PIANO STUDY

High school credits for piano study may be awarded to those pupils who wish to obtain them, according to Supt. W. G. Kersbergen. A student may earn two of the sixteen units necessary for graduation by taking private piano lessons. He may earn a full unit or one-half unit per year, but such one-half unit may not be counted toward graduation until one full unit has been earned. A student who wishes to earn a full unit of credit must take two 30 minute lessons or one 45 minute lesson per week for 36 weeks, and practice not less than six hours per week. He must also make one public appearance during the year.

High school credits can be awarded only by instructors who have passed the state examination for music teachers. Golda E. Mumma of Hermiston has been a state accredited teacher since 1928, and she invites pupils to the studio on Main street for full information. She is also a member of the National Guild of Piano teachers, which sponsors annual auditions for its piano students from coast to coast. Through these auditions pupils may obtain various certificates of achievement and a high school graduate may obtain a High School Diploma in Piano.

Miss Mumma will be at the Hermiston high school the opening day of school to further explain this work and contact those pupils who are interested.

Milk Notice!

DEAR CUSTOMER:

Beginning September first, deliveries of milk to your home will be discontinued by both Hermiston dairies. The milk for you will be delivered by the dairies to all stores and service stations in Hermiston that have refrigeration space available, or if you live near either of the dairies you may purchase your milk there.

We regret to have to serve our customers in this manner. Dairy delivery trucks, when used for retail delivery, are not eligible for tire recaps or replacements, therefore, we must conserve our tires by making only wholesale deliveries. The Office of Defense Transportation has ruled that all trucks must reduce mileage traveled by 25 per cent; this will help us to comply with this ruling.

We have appreciated your patronage and have enjoyed serving you, and we know you will understand our reasons for taking this action until the war is won. We are also up against shortages of labor and supplies, and in order that we may continue to serve you and that you may continue to get Grade A milk, we must ask for your complete cooperation.
