Norris Rassusman of Boardman called Wednesday evening at the E. B. Wattenburger home.

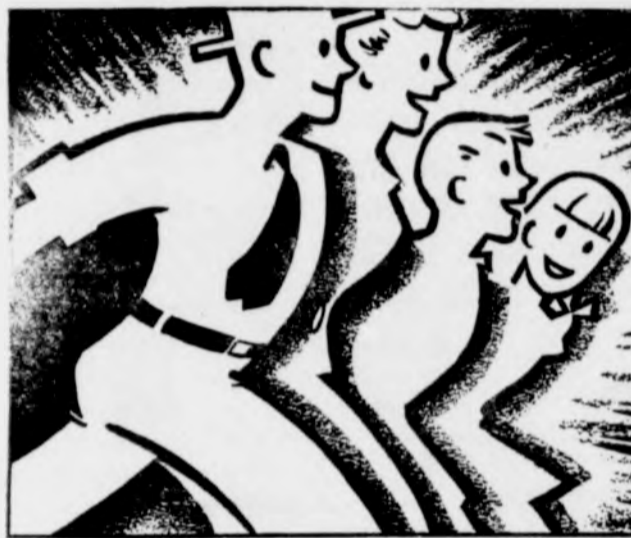
Bobby Morehead is attending a church convention for boys at Anthony Lake.
