Farm WAR NEWS

Farm War News will be a weekly feature of The Herald and is presented in cooperation with the County U. S. D. A. War Board, and designed to keep farmers informed on new developments in agriculture's wartime production program. The articles have been arranged by A. R. Coppock, chairman of the Umatilla board.

Farmers Lead Inflation Fight
The nation's farmers have been requested to take the lead in the battle against inflation. Secretary of Agriculture Claude R. Wickard, in asking for repeal of the 110 per cent of parity provision of the price control law, urges agriculture to accept parity prices in a move to halt the upward spiral of cost-of-living commodities.

Less Baling Wire in '43
A substantial decrease in the amount of baling wire for 1943 is predicted. To combat any shortage, farmers are advised to conserve old bale ties, save them for re-use next year.

Livestock Ceilings in Offing
Ceilings on livestock prices as a measure to take the squeeze off small packers, combat a possible meat shortage, have been approved by Secretary of Agriculture Claude R. Wickard. But such a plan, the Secretary declares, must not permit abnormal profits to anyone in the industry—packers, wholesalers or retailers—at the expense of the producer or consumer.

Milk Powder Output High
In line with the increased need for milk powder to conserve shipping space, nearly all of Oregon's dried milk plants are operating at capacity, the State U.S.D.A. War Board reports. Seasonal decline in milk production is being offset by diverting milk from condenseries and evaporated milk plants.
