FARM WAGE RATES SOAR IN OREGON

Definite indication of the demand for more hands on Oregon farms to harvest "food-for-victory" crops and help care for livestock is shown by data on wage rate increases in a recent review of the agricultural situation by L. R. Breithaupt, O.S.C. extension agricultural economist. Specifically, farm wage rates were approximately 50 per cent higher in Oregon this year on July 1 than at the same date in 1941, and more than twice as high as the five-year average from 1935 to 1939.

No proportionate advance occurred in the general level of farm prices, according to the index date. The Oregon farm price index advanced only approximately half as much for the comparable periods as farm wage rates in Oregon. In the country as a whole, however, the increase in farm prices was approximately as great as the increase in farm wage rates during the past year. This comes from the fact that wage rates here have advanced much faster than the national average.

The government index of prices paid by farmers for commodities, interest and taxes has advanced considerably less than the index of farm rates. It shows no increase since May, although being 14 per cent higher than in July 1941 and nearly 24 per cent above the 1935-1939 average. The general level of farm prices in the whole country is 23 per cent higher than a year ago and 45 per cent above the 1935-39 average. Farm wage rates advanced 20 per cent from July 1941 to July 1942 in the country as a whole.

MALE STUDENTS GET COMMISSIONS

Changes in regulations which open new channels for worthy young men to qualify for commissioned officers in the United States Navy and at the same time continue their studies in colleges or universities have been announced by Capt. W. J. Giles, director of Naval Officer Procurement for the thirteenth Naval district at Seattle.

The naval officer procurement program provides three routes under which worthy young men can earn the ranks of commissioned officers. Joint boards from the armed forces will call at colleges and universities during the first term of school to explain how students may start on the path toward commissioned officers in the Navy.

The new regulations ease the requirements for eyes and teeth and rule that candidates must be citizens, while the former standards set up rigid rules for eyes and teeth and called for citizenship of ten years. There are five classifications under which young men may qualify. They are V-5, the aviation cadet program, which is open to all qualified high school graduates between the ages of 18 and 26 years, V-1 for general service, V-1 for special service, V-7 for general service and V-7 for special service, depending upon the physical condition of candidates.

Young men must be enrolled or accepted for enrollment in college to qualify for V-1 or V-7. The V-5 program is open at all times to qualified high school graduates. Underclassmen will be assigned to V-1 and upperclassmen will be in V-7. Students in either classification may apply for transfer to the aviation cadet training program at any time and those meeting the requirements will receive extensive training in virtually all fields of aviation.

Students in V-1 may apply for transfer to V-7 at the conclusion of their sophomore years, and if qualified may continue in school and work toward commissions in either general or special service classifications of the navy. Those failing to qualify

will go to sea and still have the chance to qualify for commissioned officer or petty officer schools. They can apply for V-5 before going to sea and if they qualify will begin training in naval aviation.

Students in V-7 are to continue in college until graduation and then receive what amounts to post graduate naval scholarships, leading to appointments as naval officers.

The special service classifications open opportunities for commissions to those majoring in English, mathematics, physics, chemistry, naval architecture, meteorology, industrial management and business administration.

There also are opportunities in general or special service for students enrolled in pre-medic courses.

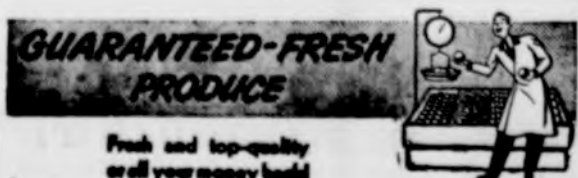
