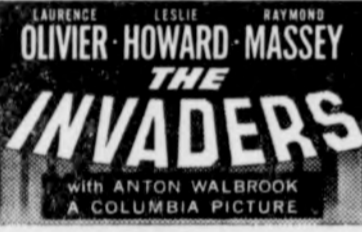

Purchase of War Bonds

The Treasury Department announced sales of war bonds in August totaled \$697,255,000 in bonds through the ten percent payroll savings plan, compared with 18,000,000 persons and \$200,000,000 in July. Treasury Secretary Morgenthau announced state war bond quotas for September, totaling \$775,000,000 for the country.

Turn In Old Batteries

The War Production Board has ruled that motorists buying new batteries must turn in the old battery before they can take delivery.

New Meat Program Due

New program to maintain record meat production, meet needs of armed forces and obtain equitable distribution of civilian supply can be expected soon, the State USDA War Board reports. Program will include: Changes in wholesale and retail meat price ceilings, due shortly. Ceilings on live animals, hogs first, cattle later, but not including farm-slaughtered meat. Meat rationing due about the first of the year, designed to balance abnormal consumer purchasing power with normal meat supplies.
