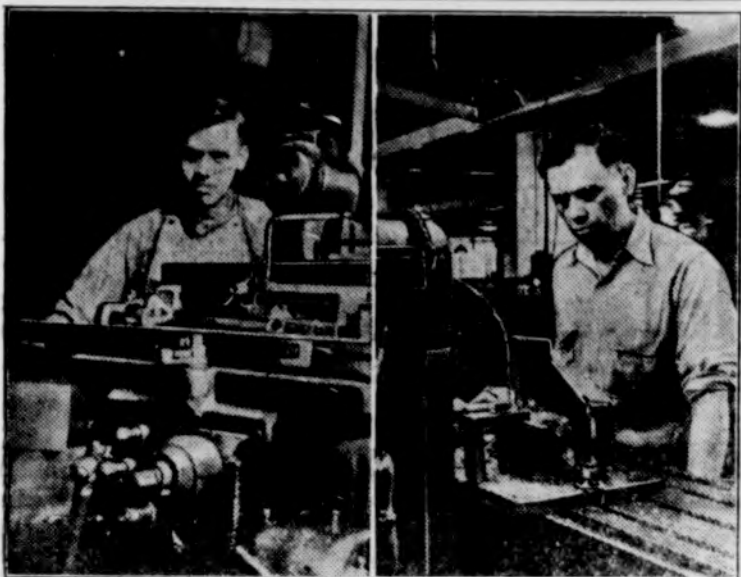


His War Work Identical to '17 Job



These unusual pictures show George Tucker of Detroit doing almost the identical armament job today that he did in World War I.

The picture at the left shows Tucker in 1917 at a milling machine in a Fisher Body plant which was engaged in building of warplanes. When this picture was taken Tucker was milling a propeller fitting.

At the right is Tucker at his job today—again operating a milling machine on aircraft manufacture in a

Fisher plant. The machine at the left was small in comparison with the one Tucker operates today, and all machines were driven off a main-line shaft instead of each having an individual motor as at present.

The manager of the plant where Tucker worked in 1917 was A. J. Fisher, who now is director of the Fisher Body Aircraft Section. Tucker, who has been with Fisher Body since 1915, is married and has one son.

DEFENSE LEADER SCHEDULED HERE IN NEAR FUTURE

Word was received in Hermiston from Ed E. Colby, field representative of the Oregon State Civilian Defense office in Salem, saying that he is soon to be assigned to rather extensive duties in Eastern Oregon and hopes to be in Hermiston and other Umatilla county localities in the near future.

Mr. Colby has recently completed a course of study in the War Department's Civilian Protection school at the University of Washington. This course, which he and many other civilian defense workers, including Jerry Owens, State Coordinator of Civilian Defense, attended, is a compact and intensive study of advanced work along lines similar to ones which Mr. Colby has taught in many Oregon communities.

To know more about this school one should read Jerry Owens' column "Jerry'scope" in the September, 1942, issue of the Oregon Legionnaire, of which Mr. Owens is the editor. In which Mr. Owens says, "Among the many subjects covered during a session are the handling of incendiary bombs and toxic gases, training air raid wardens and other civilian defense workers, military liaison, bomb reconnaissance, tactics of aerial bombing, panic prevention, plant protection, control center operation, etc."

While Mr. Colby hopes to include Hermiston in his itinerary, no date is announced, every person in Umatilla county should look forward to and allow nothing to keep him or her from attending and an all meetings called by Mr. Colby, who is the direct Field Representative of the State Office in Salem.

We cannot all have the opportunity of attending classes at the University, but we can become better informed by listening to those who have not only taught classes on many pertinent subjects, but has had the good fortune to attend one of these sessions at the University of Washington.

Mr. Colby's job is to help iron out Civilian Defense difficulties and to give the people confidence in their defense leaders, to add to the information of the people already busy on defense work, to renew the confidence of all in the local county, state and national set-up, and to get new and old workers interested in jobs for which they are best suited. He is vitally concerned with the welfare of each individual and wants everyone so well informed that in event of a raid or any other emergency, he must act spontaneously if such knowledge is to add to his safety. At such times, there will be no opportunity to consult anyone in this respect, and it is they themselves who must have the information for their own safety.

Mr. Colby will be available at whatever points his services are most needed and communities with special problems will do well to present such problems to him. He is most interested and cooperative and well equipped to make this locality a strong link in an already strong chain that is made up of local, county and state organizations which is our second line of national defense.
