SEED PURCHASE CHANGES LISTED BY COPPOCK

Expected changes in the 1943 seed purchase program were announced recently by A. R. Coppock, chairman of the county AAA committee.

Increased production of hairy vetch and annual ryegrass is wanted and Commodity Credit Corporation will offer guaranteed prices for an unlimited amount of these seeds, the chairman said. Prices will remain the same as this year's schedule—10c a pound for top-grade hairy vetch and 5c a pound for top-grade ryegrass.

For Austrian winter peas and Willamette vetch, no expansion is desired above this year's record acreage. Price support programs will be continued for the production from an acreage substantially the same as the 1942 acreage. Prices offered by Commodity Credit Corporation will remain unchanged—6 1/2 cents for Willamette vetch, 5 cents for Austrian winter peas.

No price support program has been announced for Hungarian and common vetch or crimson clover.

Production of these cover crop seeds constitute one of Oregon's most important contributions to the Food for Freedom program, he chairman explained.

The 1942 yield of Austrian Winter Peas in this county was very satisfactory and a large quantity of the seed has been shipped to the south as fast as the cleaning plants can process the seed.

Seed acquired by the government is shipped to the southern states, where it is distributed to growers under the conservation materials program to combat soil erosion and depletion. This year, with available nitrate supplies needed to make munitions, legume cover crops are even more important as a means of supplying nitrogen to the soil on Dixie-land farms.

The changes in the program do not reflect any failure on the part of Oregon growers to produce the needed amounts of seed, the chairman declared. The adjustments for 1943 represent changes in need, brought about largely by war conditions.

OREGON HELPS IN NATIONAL CROP PRODUCTION

American agriculture has scored an important victory on the food production front, and Oregon farmers have contributed their share of this production miracle, according to R. B. Taylor, chairman of Oregon's U. S. D. A. war board.

Totally unprecedented yields have boosted 1942 crop production nationally to an estimated 13 per cent above the previous peak year, 1937, and it is now expected that this year's output will top 1941 production by 14 per cent. New records are being set for grain, hay, oil seeds, beans, peas, sugar crops, fruits and vegetables. Milk and egg production and livestock and poultry numbers continue to exceed all previous levels.

The September crop report shows that Oregon production is measuring well up to the national increases. Besides meeting or exceeding most of the major crop goals, farmers of this state are making a number of outstanding contributions to the food-for-freedom program, Taylor said.

A record-breaking volume of cover crop seeds is moving from Oregon to help southern states' farmers maintain soil fertility despite the scarcity of war-needed nitrate fertilizers. Oregon growers produced an estimated 175,000,000 pounds of this seed

this year, including vetches, Austrian winter peas, crimson clover and ryegrass.
