RUBBER GOODS NOW RATIONED

The government is now taking steps to guarantee necessary protective rubber footwear to workers in essential industries and consequently rubber boots and work shoes have now been placed on the rationing list. This type of footwear requires such important quantities of crude rubber that it has been necessary to cut production to the bone.

To allay any fears among consumers, it should be pointed out that most types of rubber footwear, such as men's overshoes, work and dress rubbers; women's and children's boots, galoshes, gaiters and rubbers, are not rationed. By use of substitutes and reclaimed rubber, it is possible to make this type of footwear with a small percentage of crude rubber.

On the other hand, it is vital to the welfare of the nation to use the utmost care in the use of all rubber footwear to make it last as long as possible.
