### HERMISTON 4-H CLUB MEMBERS AT P. I. SHOW

John McMullen, Jack Rogers, Emley Rogers, David Dufur, Gordon Shown, Joann Graves, Glen Wilcox, Creston Buzzard of Hermiston and Jim Hogg, Bob Attebury and Marion Andrews of Stanfield exhibited beef calves at the Pacific International 4-H Fat Stock show in Portland last week. They were accompanied by Gene Lear, assistant county agent.

Fourteen beef calves were exhibited at the show by the Umatilla County Beef club members. All but three of the calves shown were awarded prizes. The highest beef placing was won by John McMullen, who placed fourth in a class of about 40.

Creston Buzzard exhibited a pen of 4 fat hogs in the special stockyards pig feeding contest and won first place in his district which comprises all northeastern Oregon counties.

All stock exhibited at the show was sold at auction sale Friday. The steers and hogs averaged about sixteen cents per pound when sold. Total prize earnings of the local delegation amounted to \$85.00.

### HUNTING BAN IS LIFTED OCT. 10

At its meeting Saturday, October 10, the state game commission rescinded its order of September 24 which closed the entire state to hunting and angling. The effect of this order restored the hunting and angling seasons in accord with the commission's orders of last January so far as angling is concerned, and the order of last June concerning hunting.

More specifically the deer season is now open in all of Oregon save in the slash areas within some of the forests of eastern Oregon, which will be posted. The pheasant season is open as outlined in the commission's synopsis.

In releasing the order the commission urged all sportsmen to exercise caution wherever they go and particularly in forests where there remains some critical areas.

### FARMERS MUST REGISTER TRUCKS

Every farmer who owns a truck, trailer or pickup must apply for a "Certificate of War Necessity" to operate the vehicle after November 15, and the Umatilla county USDA war board is preparing to assist county truck owners make application during a three-day registration period, October 22, 23 and 24. Jens Terjeson, chairman of the county farm transportation committee, will be in charge of the registration.

Without a certificate, truck owners will not be able to obtain gasoline, parts or tires, the chairman has stated. Application blanks are now being mailed to all truck owners. Further information as to locations of registration places will be announced next week.

### Let's have **MACARONI and CHEESE!**

Cheese and Macaroni dishes are the "stick-to-the-ribs" kind that men like.

#### BAKED MACARONI & CHEESE

- 1/2 lb. macaroni
- 3 tbsp. flour
- 1/2 lb. grated American Cheese
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 2 cups milk
- 3 tbsp. butter
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1 cup dry bread crumbs

Cook macaroni in boiling, salted water until tender; rinse, drain. Make white sauce of butter, flour, milk and seasonings; add two-thirds of the cheese, stir till melted. Pour over macaroni in greased baking dish. Sprinkle crumbs and remaining cheese over top. Bake in moderate oven (325 degrees) 30 minutes. For Tomato Macaroni, add 1 1/2 cups cooked tomatoes after half the macaroni is added. Serves six.
