## ECHO NEWS ITEMS

Mayor C. H. Esselstyn, who has served as councilman or mayor of this city since 1926, announces that he will not be a candidate for reelection, and to date no one has been found who seeks the honor of heading the city government for the next two years. Councilmen Joe Middleton, M. E. Coe and C. L. Gray, whose terms expire this fall, have expressed their willingness to run for another term. Holdover councilmen, whose terms run until 1944, are Muri Berry, Edward Liesegang and John Oliver.

NET FISHING

★ ★ This measure is Senate Bill No. 53, passed by overwhelming vote in Senate and House, signed by the Governor making it a law. Referendum has been invoked by those who would exploit, by "net fishing"—the game of game fish—steelhead. Does not effect Columbia River commercial fishing.

On September 30th, the United States Government ordered released for civilian use, 20% of the 1942 salmon pack, which is proof that there is no shortage of good fish for the army requirements.

Oregon is the only state in the United States which permits game fish to be taken with "set nets".

Funeral services were held at the Echo Methodist church Saturday afternoon for James A. McCarty, age 73, pioneer bee man of the Butter Creek district, who died at the Pendleton hospital October 21. Rev. Malcolm B. Ballinger, local pastor, presided at the service. Pall bearers were Allen Thomson, Sloan Thomson, Frank Sloan, Walter Moorehouse, Fred Buchanan and C. H. Bartholomew.

Mr. McCarty was born in Polk county August 15, 1869. He came to this neighborhood in 1877 with his parents and when he was 21 took up a homestead adjoining their place on Butter Creek. For 52 years he resided on this farm and engaged in bee culture, which he had started when a boy of 15, and developed into one of the largest honey producers of the county. About a year ago he suffered a stroke and has been confined to bed since then. A heart attack October 10 necessitated his being taken to the Pendleton hospital where death occurred. Mr. McCarty was a bachelor. He is survived by two brothers, William and Otis McCarty of Butter Creek, four nieces and five nephews.
