**BULLDOGS LOSE AT KENNEWICK**

After slumping badly in their last two games with Heppner and Pendleton, the Hermiston high school Bulldogs finally hit the depths in their game at Kennewick last Friday night under the lights. This and the fact that the Kennewick boys were red-hot were the main reasons why the Bulldogs went down to defeat 25-12.

Hermiston kicked off in the first quarter and after a few line plays Kennewick started a drive that ended in a touchdown about halfway through the first period. The score came with Garber, Kennewick left half, carrying the ball over right tackle for 15 yards and a score. The try for point by Kauth was blocked.

After Kennewick had kicked off, Hermiston tried a few line plays but failed to gain. The Bulldogs were forced to attempt a kick but the ball was blocked and recovered by the Kennewick left guard, giving them the ball on the Hermiston 30. A few plays later Garber scored another touchdown and the extra point attempt was wide, making the score at the end of the quarter 12-0 in Kennewick's favor.

Kennewick again kicked off and then the Hermiston attack suddenly caught fire and the Bulldogs looked like the team that beat Union. Rugg reeled off a run good for 17 yards and a touchdown. This play had been brought about after a gain by 20 yards by Al Buell on a quarterback sneak and a pass from Davis to Alford good for 10 yards. The try for point was blocked. In this quarter Garber and company gathered in another touchdown with Garber packing the ball. Kauth's try for point split the uprights, leaving the halftime score at Kennewick 19, Hermiston 6.

In the third quarter Kennewick got their final points by a tricky pass play which set up an end run by Garber for the score after the Hermiston line had held for three plays on the one yard line.

The Bulldogs again got up a little steam in the fourth period and after a drive that had carried them for 65 yards they scored on a line smash from the one yard stripe. The try for point was a little wide and so it ended the scoring.

It was at this time that a very unfortunate accident happened. Bill Kirk, star Kennewick right half, was tackled by a charging Hermiston line and his leg was severely injured. He is a senior playing his second year of football.

**ARMY AIR FORCE HAS PENDLETON FOR RECRUITING**

Pendleton Field—An Army Air Force recruiting station was opened this week in the headquarters building at Pendleton Field, it was announced by Lt. Col. John A. McCready, commanding officer of the field.

The station will accept enlistments in the Army Air Forces only. Capt. Garrett F. Burns is in charge of the office and is being assisted by recruiting sergeant Jack P. Grege and recruiting clerk Pvt. Thomas L. Sims. Opportunities for technical training are offered through Army Air Force Technical Training schools. In the schools men are instructed in aircraft mechanics, engine overhaul, radio mechanics, radio operation, sheet metal work, and welding. Previous experience is not necessary for assignment to these schools. A good mind and body, ambition and the will to "Keep 'em Flying" are the primary prerequisites.

Capt. Burns stated that the enlistment office at Pendleton Field makes it possible for all those who desire to enter the Air Forces to do so in a direct manner, thereby eliminating delay and avoiding the possibility of being assigned to another service.

An effort is being made to acquaint the people of this area with all existing regulations involved in the procedure of enlistment. The new office at Post Headquarters is fully equipped for this.
