Mr. and Mrs. Julius Gimble spent the week end in Portland.

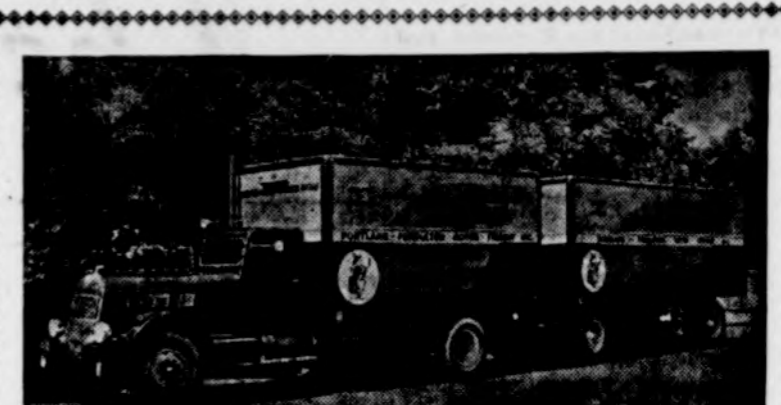
