FALL SHIPMENTS OF SEED ENDED

Twelve hundred carloads of Oregon-grown cover crop seed have been shipped to southern and east central states under the government's 1942 seed purchase program, the state AAA office announced this week. This is more than 17 70-car trainloads.

While this is by far the largest volume shipped since the government's purchase program was started three years ago, southern states growers could have used much more seed had it been ready for shipment earlier. N. C. Donaldson, AAA executive assistant, reports.

Lateness of Oregon's harvest, the shortage of help in warehouses and cleaning plants, and transportation problems all combined to delay deliveries this year.

The cover crop planting season has ended throughout most of the southern states, Donaldson pointed out. Only hairy vetch, annual ryegrass and common vetch are being shipped now, but the government will continue to buy all varieties of seed on the purchase schedule that is offered by eligible Oregon growers.

Seed that is not cleaned, tested and

fumigated in time for shipment this year will be held in storage and shipped next spring, the AAA official said. To avoid congestion in Willamette valley warehouses, storage space has been arranged in other states for any overflow.

Donaldson attributes the greatly increased demand for cover crop seed to scarcity of commercial nitrates—now needed for munitions—and to a growing awareness throughout the south of the value of cover cropping to build soils and check erosion.

He reported that hairy vetch is the variety most in demand for cover cropping in the southern states. To meet this demand, Oregon growers are asked to increase production of this seed crop by 50 per cent next year. More annual ryegrass is also wanted. The 1943 purchase program will include the same varieties of seed at the same prices as this year, but with pea and Willamette vetch acreage limited as to eligibility.

Farm WAR NEWS

Machinery Freeze Explained

The present "freeze" of new farm machinery will remain in effect until the new rationing program is announced, the county USDA War Board reports. In cases where new machinery is needed immediately to maintain production, appeals can be filed with the county farm machinery rationing committee. Repair parts are not frozen, but attachments may be sold only by a retail dealer, provided he has them in stock.

Probe On Farm Labor Due

The Senate committee on farm labor conditions in the 11 western states, including Oregon, will open hearings on November 16. The first hearing has been tentatively set for Los Angeles.

Farm Labor Action Asked

Secretary Claude Wickard has requested immediate action to keep manpower on the farms for the crucial 1943 production job, the Oregon USDA War Board reports. He has recommended that all essential farm workers get occupational draft deferment, and that war industries holding government contracts be prevented from hiring such workers. More than 1,600,000 workers left the farms in the past year, 60 per cent for war work and 40 per cent for the armed forces.

Milk Cans, Fencing Rationed

Information received by the Umatilla county USDA farm machinery rationing committee indicates that milk cans and fencing supplies will shortly be added to the list of items rationed by the committee. It is expected, the committee reports, that OPA's recently acquired authority to ration milk cans and fencing will be delegated to the Department of Agriculture.

Truck Applications Taken

Farm applications for new trucks are now filed with the county farm transportation committee, the county USDA War Board announced. This new procedure has been agreed upon by the Office of Defense Transportation and the Department of Agriculture. Jens Terjesen is chairman of the county transportation committee, which has headquarters at the Agricultural Conservation association office at 329 S. W. 1st St., Pendleton, Oregon.

Got Your "War Certificate"?

Farm truck owners who have not received an application for ODT Certificate of War Necessity are advised to consult the county farm transportation committee for necessary procedure.

AAA Phosphate In Demand

The 1,000 tons of superphosphate allocated to Oregon for distribution this fall "lasted quick" the state AAA office reports. All of it was speedily requested by counties, and orders from farmers indicate that twice that amount could have been used.

Bean Prices Supported

The state USDA War Board has been informed that the department of agriculture has announced a new price support program for dry edible beans. Prices will be supported at levels equivalent to 90 per cent of parity.
