## FARM PRICE LAW WILL AFFECT INCOME & COSTS

Operation of the new federal law passed October 2 providing for further price control, particularly on farm products, will doubtless affect both farm income and farm costs. Certain farm products are already near the authorized price ceilings or stabilization price level. Others are considerably lower than the authorized ceiling level and therefore may rise if market supply and demand conditions support such rise.

While this is likely to result in some further increase in the general level of farm prices, it is probable that prices will remain fairly close to present levels for the remainder of 1942 at least.

Under the provisions of this new law, farm price ceilings may be established, but not below 100 per cent of parity or the highest market level during 1942 up to September 15, whichever is higher. It is further provided that such ceilings are to be raised if any are too low to reflect increases in farm labor and other costs since January 1, 1941.

An uncertain factor is how this last provision is to be carried out. The exact procedure remains to be

worked out in case it is shown that the increase in the prices for certain commodities has been too small to reflect higher costs. The procedure will become more complicated if farm labor costs continue to rise owing to the scarcity of help and relatively higher industrial wage rates.

Other items of possible increased cost may be commodities used by farmers in production and living, repairs and other services, interest and taxes. The hope is, of course, that these may also be stabilized with farm prices.

The act also provides for price floors for cotton, corn, wheat, rice, tobacco, and peanuts at not more than 90 per cent of parity, except that the floor for corn and wheat used for feed is not to be above 85 per cent of parity.

How effective the farm price ceilings will be against the pressure of the huge demand for farm products, owing to the great increase in consumer purchasing power and military and lend-lease requirements, is another question which remains to be answered by future events. On the whole, however, substantial progress is being made with measures for the stabilization of farm prices, as well as with the other six points in the nation's wartime program to control inflation.

The complete seven-point program, it will be recalled, includes heavy taxation, retail price ceilings, wage stabilization, farm price stabilization, more bond sales, rationing of scarce commodities, and more debt payment with less credit buying.

Administrative action under the last law began almost immediately and included the appointment of a director of economic stabilization who will be advised by a policy board composed of government officials and representatives of agriculture, labor and industrial management.

The progress against inflation to date, however, has not been enough. War expenditures have reached a rate of 65 billion dollars a year and are scheduled to go higher. This is more than twice the amount being collected by the federal government as taxes and from the sale of war bonds. Consumer incomes reflect this high level of war expenditures while the supply of consumer goods is being curtailed.

This buying pressure on wholesale and retail prices by consumers with billions of surplus income is expected to be held in check by the extension of wartime controls of wages and

prices and the other measures included in the inflation control program. Canada is ahead of this country with anti-inflation measures and is placing dependence largely upon soaking up excess consumer purchasing power with more severe income taxes than are proposed here, and by enforced savings.

Arrangements for the P. P. & L. scholarship, which will supplement regular 4-H club work, have been made through H. C. Seymour, state 4-H club leader, and William A. Schoenfeld, state director of agricultural extension work, said Thrasher.

All merchants are warned that they must establish maximum prices of fall and winter seasonal commodities under the Office of Price Administration Maximum Price Regulation No. 210 before they may be sold.

Pricing under this regulation is necessary because these commodities were not generally sold in March when the General Maximum Price Regulation's base price period was designated.

The Hermiston Board 30-3 OPA War Price and Rationing Board has a supply of digests of MPR No. 210 and advises merchants to call at the board headquarters at Ration Board at Hermiston immediately and obtain copies of the digest.

The regulation covers a wide variety of commodities from winter clothing to andirons, footballs and Christmas tree lights.
