Farm WAR NEWS

Feed Wheat Price Set

Feed wheat prices will remain at present levels for the month of December. Price of Commodity Credit wheat, delivered in this county in ear-load lots, will stay at 91 cents a bushel, or \$30.33 a ton. Information on marketing wheat, which may be purchased by either dealers or farmers for use as feed, may be obtained from the county AAA office.

Welding Rod Available

Repairmen and farmers who have been unable to obtain welding rod to repair farm machinery are advised to contact the county USDA War Board for information on obtaining a supply of rod for immediate needs.

To Attend Wheat League

Two members of the county AAA committee, A. R. Coppock, chairman, and Jens Terjeson, will attend the meeting of the Eastern Oregon Wheat League at LaGrande next week. Mr. Coppock, who also heads the county USDA War Board, said that committee members from all Oregon counties will meet at LaGrande the day before the Wheat League meets, to discuss 1943

production goals and problems with representatives of the state war board and AAA office.

Freeze Order Eased

An amendment to the farm machinery freeze order reduces to 13 the number of items in Schedule II. These are items frozen at manufacturer and distributor levels. The amendment will make it possible for dealers to obtain hand-operated and horse-drawn equipment from their distributors for resale to farmers. The county farm machinery rationing committee will inform dealers of the new provisions.

Farm Workers Deferred

Selective Service Director Hershey has ordered draft boards to defer necessary farm workers at least until they are satisfactorily replaced. The new labor stabilization program for livestock, dairy and poultry farms will be in operation in Oregon soon.

Repair Parts Available

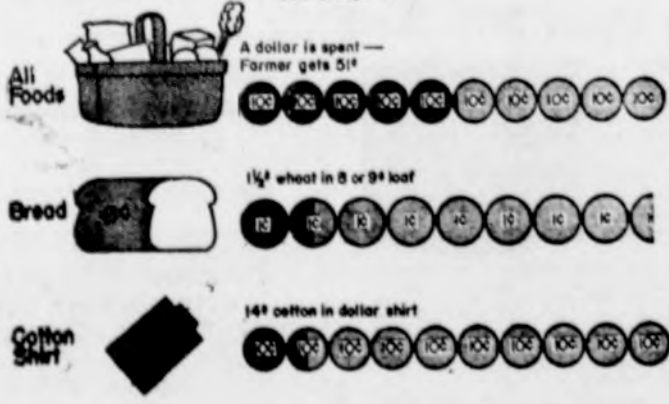
Repair parts are not included in the farm machinery "freeze" order, the county USDA War Board reports. Farmers should have no difficulty in obtaining parts to get all machinery and equipment into top shape now.

New Controls for Textile Bags

The War Production Board's placing of strict new controls on textile bags is cited by the county USDA War Board as a convincing reason for conserving all bags, especially burlap.

FARMER'S SHARE OF STORE PRICES

Jan.-June, 1942



Food doubles its price after it leaves the farm. Some farm products, on which processing and other costs are high, more than double their price before reaching consumers, latest figures from the U. S. Department of Agriculture reveal. There's only about 1 1/2 cents worth of wheat in an 8 or 9 cent loaf of bread, for instance, and about 14 cents worth of cotton in a dollar shirt.

The WPB order prohibits use of new or used bags as sandbags, provides that bags for raw sugar and wool may be used for no other purpose, limits sale of new burlap to any one person to 50 per cent of number sold him in 1941, and provides that new burlap bags may be used to pack only certain specified materials—barley, beans and peas, chemicals except fertilizers, dairy products, mohair, potatoes, rock salt, rice, seeds, feeds and meals for animal consumption, dried fruits, nuts, raw sugar, wheat, wool and wool products.

More Spuds Wanted in '43

Oregon's 1943 potato goal will call for a sharp increase in acreage, the state USDA War Board reports. A federal price support program will replace AAA potato allotments and payments in 1943 program, but growers must plant a least 90 per cent of farm acreage goal to be eligible for price support.

"Off-Highway" Gas Rationed

Farmers should file an "off-highway" application form to obtain gasoline for tractors, and other farm equipment. Forms can be obtained from local rationing boards.

Oil Meal Prices Cut

Poultrymen and stockmen will save \$3 to \$4 a ton on oil meal and cake as a result of price reductions ordered by OPA.

Food to Africa

To support the North African campaign, a total of 33 million dollars

worth of American farm products have moved to Egypt in the past 19 months. The shipments were mainly meats and processed foods.
