MONDAY MARKS DATE OF ATTACK

A two-day nation-wide observance of the anniversary of the attack on Pearl Harbor will be sponsored by the Office of War Information. Joining in the observance will be the War and Navy Departments, all other war agencies, war plants, labor, schools, colleges and numerous other organizations.

The anniversary will be observed, Sunday, December 6 and Monday, December 7, wherever there are Americans around the world. The inclusion of Sunday is doubly fortunate, both because the original attack fell on a Sunday and because the tone and religious ceremonies of the Sabbath are in keeping with the spirit of re-dedication to a high purpose which will characterize this anniversary.

The OWI proposes that the nation, under the cry of "Remember Pearl Harbor—Work . . . Fight . . . Sacrifice!" will:

Honor and remember the men and women who have already given their lives in this struggle.

Give thanks to God for the nation's survival of the unprovoked attack of ruthless enemies.

Clear-headedly assess what has been done in one year of war, and what lies ahead to be done in terms of "Work . . . Fight . . . Sacrifice."

Rededicate the nation's strength, its time, its wealth and its very life to preserving a concept of life more precious than individual life itself: to work, fight, sacrifice for all that is contained in the Bill of Rights and the Constitution of the United States of America.

The OWI proposes that Sunday be dedicated to solemn memorial for those who died at Pearl Harbor and those who have died since, to thanksgiving for our survival during the

first critical year of the war and to re-dedication of all our resources to the spiritual values which are at stake in this war.

The hour of the Pearl Harbor attack (2:20 p. m. E.W.T.) December 7, will be specially marked, but no ceremony should delay war production.

NEW STICKERS TO APPEAR SOON

The windshield stickers validating the 1943 motor vehicle registrations will be available early in December, but all motorists should bear in mind that the 1942 plates must be left on their cars, it was announced today at the secretary of state's office.

For the first time since Oregon started issuing annual license plates, no new plates will be issued to motorists whose cars were registered in this state in 1942. They will receive instead a sticker, commemorating the one hundredth anniversary of the great immigration to Oregon in 1843. This sticker is to be placed in the upper center of the windshield, directly behind the rear-view mirror.

Motorists were urged to make their applications early this year in order to avoid the mail rush of the holiday season. Stickers must be on the windshields after January 1, but they may be attached any time after December 15.

SLOWER SPEED SLOWS DEATH RATE IN OREGON

The October traffic death rate in Oregon dropped 19 per cent from the rate recorded for October of 1941. Earl Snell, secretary of state, said today. The rate for this October was 10.3 compared to 12.7 a year ago.

While the death rate dropped 19 per cent, motor vehicle use, as shown by gasoline consumption, dropped only 16 per cent. This, Snell says, indicates Oregon drivers are driving with greater care this year.

For the ten-month period, gasoline consumption dropped off ten per cent while the death rate showed a reduction of 26 per cent. The rate for January-October period this year was 8.3 compared to a rate of 11.3 last year.

The death rate indicates the number of persons killed per one hundred million miles of travel.

BOSTON BAKED BEANS
 5 cups cooked dried beans 1½ tsp. salt
 1½ cup finely chopped onion 2 tbsps. dark molasses
 1½ tsp. prepared mustard 5 slices bacon

Place cooked beans in well-greased 1½ qt. casserole. Thoroughly combine other ingredients, except bacon. Pour over beans. Strip with bacon; bake in moderate oven (350° F.) 1 hour and 15 minutes or until brown. Serves 6.

HOW TO COOK BEANS

UP-TO-DATE bean cookery suggests that for cooking navy, pink and red, kidney or cranberry beans: Pick over beans, removing damaged beans or foreign particles. Wash in sieve or bowl. Do not soak. Although soaking cuts cooking time, it makes beans mushy. Place in kettle 4 times greater in volume than beans. Cover with hot water; add 1 tsp. salt for each cup beans; cover. Simmer until beans are tender, 2 to 3 hours. Add water as needed.
