Game Commission To Meet
The Oregon State Game Commission will hold a public hearing at ten o'clock, Saturday morning, January 9, in its Portland office, to consider regulations for the 1943 angling season. Bag limits and open seasons for game fish, as well as regulations affecting methods of taking, will be determined at that time.

CLASSIFICATION CARD ESSENTIAL

Beginning February 1, all men in the 18 to 45 age groups who for six months or more have been subject to registration under the selective service act for possible military duty will be required to carry their classification cards showing that they are in communication with their local boards and have been classified as to availability for military service, the bureau of selective service of the War Manpower Commission announced on January 1.

Both the classification card and the registration certificate must be in the registrant's possession on his person after February 1 or he will be subject to fine or imprisonment or both, national headquarters said. The order does not apply to registrants who were in the 45 to 65 year-old group at the time of registration.

While possession of the registration certificate, given to men when they register, has met legal requirements heretofore, national headquarters said that a small number of persons were known to be delinquent insofar as selective service regulations are concerned because of their failure, either willful or negligent, to keep in touch with their local boards, so it had been determined to require each man to carry the classification card (form 57) as well as the registration certificate (form 2).

Therefore, all registrants in military age groups, 18 to 45 years, required to register as long as six months

ago who do not have their classification cards in their possession should communicate with their local boards prior to February 1 and obtain them so as to avoid charges of delinquency, national headquarters said.

The new requirements will cause only a handful of men to communicate with their local boards as most registrants have already obtained their classification cards. There are, however, some few registrants who have moved from one place of residence to another without notifying their local boards, and national headquarters emphasized that they must get in touch with these selective service units as soon as possible.

As an indication of how few men would be affected by the order, it was pointed out that less than three-tenths of one per cent of all registrants are believed to be delinquent by reason of failure to keep in touch with their local boards as required.
