## THERMOMETER ACTS JITTERY

"Up again, down again, Finnegan" weather has prevailed here the past week, much to the discomfort of anyone trying to get some task accomplished. From a minimum 40 degrees above zero Friday night the thermometer had dropped to 6 degrees below zero Sunday night, with the temperature going down to 8 degrees below zero by Monday morning. However, the cold wave was short lived and by Tuesday it had risen to 33 above. Not satisfied with this, Old Man Winter again did a nosedive and by Thursday morning a cold blizzard was in order. Not even the old timers are willing to prophesy any more.

But while Hermiston thought it was frigid over the week end, it was comparatively warm. At Meacham, the official low reading was 47 below zero. Oh happy day.

The abrupt cold snap played havoc with auto owners and lax residents who failed to take heed to lay in a fuel supply when warned by old timers. Radiators and batteries were frozen and fires burned low due to the shortage of coal, wood and other fuel. To make matters worse, local fuel dealers have been unable to get sufficient coal shipments through and for several days were "out". However, no serious results have been reported and residents are taking it in stride. One man stated Thursday, "Now I know how the Russians feel at Stalingrad." The center of attraction for the past week have been the bare-legged high school girls. Blue with cold and shivering from the sub-zero temperature, they still refuse to don warmer apparel.

## HANELANE NAMED UTILITY CHIEF OF CITY OF HERMISTON

## COUNCIL PLANS FOR NEW YEAR

Mayor F. C. McKenzie began another term as head of the city government Friday night when a four hour session was held in the council chambers. The mayor went into detail instructing the different committees of the council on their duties and responsibilities for the coming year. He stated that there were too many details in the present set-up to be taken care of by the mayor and the council and then suggested that a utility chief be hired to do or see that the much needed work is done around town.

The mayor and city council felt there was only one man in town that had the qualifications to take up this work. Bert Hanelane comes well qualified to take up the duties of Utility Chief of Hermiston. He was foreman of the maintenance crew of the Hermiston Irrigation district for a number of years and is experienced in the laying of pipe, concrete work, etc. As a city council member he was very active and helped the city out of many difficulties when irrigation pipes were stopped up, or ditches washed out. Just recently he resigned as janitor for the Hermiston grade school and has been employed the past few weeks at the Tum-A-Lum Lumber company.

The resignation of Mr. Hanelane as present city councilman, and with Dan Gray, who was re-elected councilman at the last election, leaving the city council, there are two seats open to the city council. These will be filled at the next meeting which will be held Friday, January 29.

W. W. Felthouse was elected president of the council for the new year. Mr. Felthouse is a newly elected member of the council but has previously served several terms as councilman.

Mayor McKenzie re-appointed Ben Nation as Chief of Police, and Al Shultz will be retained on the police force to assist Mr. Nation. After the first of February, when Mr. Hanelane takes up his duties as Utility Chief, he will assist the police in some of the morning duties. Other city officers appointed by the mayor and confirmed by the council were: W. J. Warner, re-appointed as city attorney; Kenneth Gibbs, re-appointed water superintendent; Dr. F. B. Belt, re-appointed city health officer; and Otto Pierce was appointed fire chief. Al Quiring was appointed as a member of the library board.

It was brought out at the meeting Friday that financially the city is in a bad shape. Expenses during the boom days ran high, and with the extra police work and other extra expenses of running the city, the city treasurer still has to pay out better than a thousand dollars a month. When the budget committee met last year they allowed more than three thousand dollars as expected revenues from licenses on pin-ball games, card tables, etc. Meanwhile the state police clamped down on these devices and consequently the revenue from these hit the bottom. When the next budget committee meets they are allowed to increase the taxes only six per cent, but it was brought out that this still would not be enough to meet the rising expenses. Considerable discussion was given a business tax to raise money for city expenses.

According to the city attorney, there are only two ways whereby the city can get out of this difficulty, one by a special election to raise the taxes more than the six per cent limitation, or to greatly curtail the expenses of the city. If the latter is undertaken, it will be to the detriment of the city since much street work, water system work and other things are needed to take care of a city that has more than doubled in population during the past year.

## EXAMINER HERE NEXT WEDNESDAY

A change in the schedule of the state driver's license examiner's visit to Hermiston was announced today by the secretary of state.

Effective after the first of the year, the examiner will be at the Hermiston City Library one Wednesday of each month from 10 to 4 p. m. Formerly the examiner was in Hermiston on Thursdays. He will appear on Wednesday, January 27th.
